

Trustees Approve Faculty Changes

Promotions, retirements, title changes and leaves were approved by the College's Board of Trustees at its weekend meeting. Promotions included Kenneth L. Holderman, associate professor and assistant director of engineering extension to professor and assistant director of engineering extension; Dr. Ernest A. Lachner, assistant professor of fish culture to associate professor of fisheries biology; and John N. Seiler, assistant professor to associate professor of engineering extension. Retirements included those of Dr. Jabir Shibli, professor of mathematics; Dr. William E. Butt, professor of economics; and Paul P. Korb, agricultural extension representative. Dr. Butt was named professor emeritus of economics. Dr. Shibli, who will retire on Jan. 31, joined the faculty as associate professor of mathematics in 1921, while Dr. Butt, whose retirement is effective Jan. 4, has been on the faculty since 1920. Korb, who had served in Sullivan, and later in Tioga county, since he joined the extension services in 1918, will retire Dec. 31.

Student Service Leader To Discuss World Needs

Dr. Malcolm Adiseshiah, associate general secretary of International Student service, will lead a discussion of "World Politics versus World Need" in 304 Old Main 3 p.m. Sunday. Dr. Adiseshiah has recently returned from India and is an expert on student and university needs in Southeast Asia. In addition to his travels throughout Southeast Asia in the past year he has visited all the countries of Central and Eastern Europe. The program is sponsored by the World Fellowship commission of PSCA. Dorothy Park and William Niering are the co-chairmen.

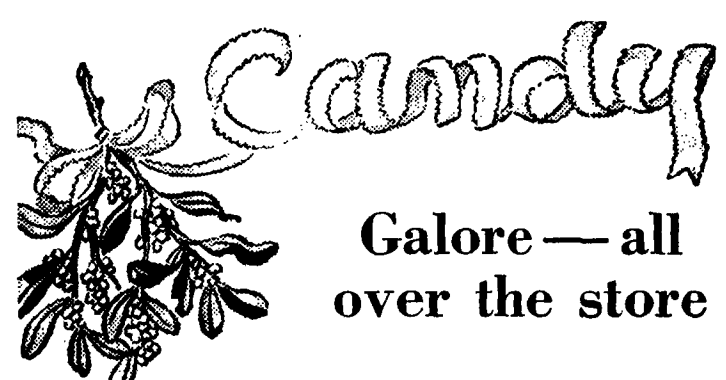
