There Is a College Co-op

TO THE EDITOR: I, as many students, was very much disappointed to hear the decision of the trustees on the co-op program and would like to add a little kindling wood to the fire to keep up the fight. The main objection of the trustees seems to be that "... it is not in order for building space, light, heat, and maintenance services to be used for a project which will compete with private enterprise." It seems an interesting change of policy when there is already at least one "co-operative" working on campus, The Pennsylvania State College Creamery.

I do not wish to stir up trouble when objections to the creamery are now quiet but I would like to bring to the attention of the Trustees and all others interested in the co-op that the College has done nothing to limit the sale of dairy products in town when the local dairy manufacturers complained that the College was giving unfair competition.

The creamery does not have to pay for light, heat, building maintenance, nor for the time the College faculty put in so can afford to give the farmers, whose milk they buy besides the milk produced at the College, a larger "bonus" for their milk above the standard price. Although the College has tried to restrict much informa-

tion on this subject, they are quite willing to let people read the policy under which they work.

I believe that similar conditions exist in the Home Ec dining room. The point I would like to bring to the attention of those working for the co-op is that there might not be anything as effective in persuading the Trustees to change their minds as their own arguments on similar subjects.
