Notebooks, fillers, and pencils will be the objects of a drive to aid foreign students overseas beginning Monday. Frank Tidona, student chairman of the campus unit, American Red Cross, which is sponsoring the drive, has asked that each student contribute one new notebook, two or three fillers and one pencil.

The need for this drive, which is going on on college campuses throughout the country, has arisen because European industries have been reconverted for immediate essentials and manufacturing output of school supplies is insuffiient, Tidona said.

Paper is so scarce that students are taking notes on wrapping paper, old newspapers, and discarded paper bags, he added.
