

Cagers Smother Depauw, Prepare for Navy, Owls

With field goals dropping from all angles, plays working smoothly, and the sliding-zone bottling up Depauw, the Penn State basketball team racked up its third straight win by trouncing the Tigers 68-49 before 5000 fans at Rec Hall Saturday.

Coach Lawther will have little time to enjoy Saturday's victory, however, since he will take his

Lions to Navy, Wednesday and Temple, Saturday for two games slated to test the three game winning streak of the cagers.

Hitting the basket for 21 points, two short of the Rec Hall record, Jackie Biery led the Penn State team to its eighth win in fourteen games.

The rest of the team, following Biery's example, scored field goals with a great consistency, and sank almost 50 per cent of their shots by the half.

The loose, man-to-man defense of the visitors enabled the Lawthermen to drop set shots from the outside and to work screening plays under the basket. By halftime, the College squad built up a 31-23 lead.

Tankers Top Dickinson

The Penn State tankmen broke into the win column in fine style Saturday afternoon, sinking the swimmers of Dickinson College, 54-21.

Despite the fact that the Dickinson natators were not up to the competition that the Blue and White has faced in the last two meets, the Guttermen still showed up exceptionally well and demonstrated their constant improvement.

Bill Schildmacher capped two firsts for the Lions in the 50 and 100-yard free style events. Bob Grossman not only won the 200-yard breast stroke, but was instrumental in winning the 300-yard medley relay, the first time the team has taken this event this season.

Sophomore Cal Folmsbee executed his third consecutive triumph in diving, and remains undefeated in this event. Lion John McCrory also contributed heavily to the point total, earning second place in the 50 and 100 free style.

The outstanding weaknesses again showed up in the back stroke and distance races. Whitmore of Dickinson took two out of the three firsts his squad earned in the 220 and 440-yard free style swims.

Cadets Edge Lion Runners; Karver Wins Garden Mile

The "What's the Matter With Karver Club?" which organized after the Lion flash placed 1st in the Millrose Games, did not hold its meeting yesterday since the Boyertown flash came from last place to win the Baxter mile Saturday night at Madison Square Garden in 4:15.

Two former Penn State runners, Curt Stone and Barney Ewell, finished among the winners in the same meet when Stone took the two-mile in 9:04.2 to retire the Toussaint Cup, and Ewell placed second in the 60-yard dash behind Ed Conwell.

A poor start coupled with a few elbows shoved Karver to last place as the milers rounded the first curve. Running smoothly, he passed Larry Ellis, NYU; Les Mac-Mitchell, Bill Hulse and Tom Quinn of the New York A.C., and Browning Ross of Villanova to take the lead at the three-quarter mark.

Quinn made a final bid for the lead when he passed Karver with 3½ laps of the 1½-lap mile left to run.

NYU Subdues Fencers

A hopelessly outclassed Blue and White fencing squad went down to a 22.5 defeat before the blades of the New York University swordsmen at Rec Hall Saturday.

Dave Ozarow accounted for the only Lion victory in the foil matches, while Paul Younkin took the one win in sabre. Rolf Wald, Arthur Ward and Floyd Eberts each took one epee bout.

Gehrdes Sets Records

Coach Chick Werner's trackmen won race after race and set two meet records, but after the dust cleared from the infield in the West Point field house Saturday afternoon, the Blue and White found that their wins were to no avail since the Cadets swept three of the five field events to down the Lions 67 2/3 to 50 1/3.

Jim Gehrdes topped the tall timbers in 7.3 to cut one-tenth of a second off the mark George Sylvester of Army set just two weeks ago. Showing his versatility, Jim competed in the 80-yard low hurdles and not only won the event, but also pulled down Army's mark of :09.1 set in 1946 by Max Minor to :08.7, to break the second record of the afternoon.

Horace Ashenfelter ably stepped into the breach created by Jerry Karver's participation in the New York A.C. meet and scored an easy victory in the mile in 4:24.5. Ash later returned to score his second win, completely outclassing the competition in his specialty, the two-mile run, in 9:41.8.

Complete shutouts in the broad jump, high jump, and 35-pound weight throw gave the Cadets 27 points before a Nittany runner set a foot on the track.

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Gymnasts Stretch Win Streak to Ten

Ray Sorensen, a top Olympic threat, led Penn State to a 71-25 triumph over Syracuse Saturday by finishing first on the horizontal bar and parallel bars and runner-up on the side horse.

It was the second win in as many meets and the tenth straight victory over a three-year period for Penn State's Eastern champs, coached by Gene Wettstone.

Next match is slated for Saturday against a formidable Army team at West Point.

In trouncing Syracuse, the Nittany squad swept firsts in all events. Bill Meade captured the

tumbling event, Bill Bonsall copped the flying rings, Joe Linn annexed the rope climb toga in 4.2 and Steve Greene excelled in the side horse event.

A close runner-up to Sorensen on the horizontal bar was Mike Kurovski, who scored 253 out of a possible 300, while Sorensen tallied 257.

Although this is only the second year of gymnastics at Syracuse, the Orangemen performed creditably and should be much improved next season.

Bill Meade's 274 points racked up in tumbling was the highest total in the meet.

To the Students and Faculty Of Penn State:

A World War II combat veteran, wounded in action in Northern Italy, walked into a State College barber shop last Saturday afternoon and asked for a haircut. HE WAS REFUSED. The barber explained that, WHILE HE WAS NOT PERSONALLY OPPOSED TO CUTTING NEGROES' HAIR, HE COULD NOT DO SO UNTIL THE OTHER BARBERS IN TOWN AGREED TO DO THE SAME.

This is NOT the first time such an incident has occurred. Last year the State College Council on Racial Equality made several attempts to convince the barbers that they should make NO discrimination against Negro customers, but the effort was in vain. Even with a petition signed by almost 2,000 local residents and students promising to patronize shops that permitted Negro patronage, the barbers STILL REFUSED.
