The chairman called for a vote of the assembly, after stating that a two-thirds majority was necessary to reopen nominations. When it became obvious that the neceessary two-thirds wasn't obtained, the motion was defeated.

According to Roberts' Rules, "If for any reason it is desired to reopen nominations it may be done by a majority vote. This motion is undebatable."

The chairman's ruling that a two-thirds majority was needed was not debated despite the fact that Harold Brown, All-College Cabinet parliamentarian was present
