

Dean Suggests Methods To Fight Subversive Groups

Best and most effective way of combating the activities of subversive students on college campuses is through the activities of other students, says Arthur R. Warnock, dean of men.

Subversive students, says the Dean, are those who seek to overturn by violence the American social and political order. By this is not meant liberal, progressive, or even radical students who work for change within the democratic structure, he added.

The College does not have any of the subversive movements referred to, the dean pointed out. Some schools however do. This is one of the methods of combating them, he said.

Students should move in a democratic way through their student governments or by other methods open to them, advises Dean Warnock.

At some schools the faculty or administration get into the picture, he said. When that happens students resent faculty interference and lose sight of the subversive issues involved.

To better qualify students for combating subversive influences,

Dean Warnock recommends a positive, constructive program designed to keep the average student better informed. He thinks discussion groups in fraternities and other living units will help to accomplish this.

A first hand education in the methods used by subversive agencies could be given to any group which would house or dine with foreign exchange students, the dean of men suggests.

Although today most people think the word communist whenever they hear the word subversive, Dean Warnock emphasized that he puts fascists and any group which seeks to subvert the existing American order through violence in the same category.

When asked if he thought subversive groups might become established at the College, Dean Warnock replied that he would not like to hazard a guess at this time, although a few years ago he felt it very unlikely.

Most of Dean Warnock's recommendations were made at a national Interfraternity conference in November.

ICG Delegates Select Officers

Charles Peet was elected chairman of the Foreign Affairs Committee at a meeting of delegates to a regional convention of the Intercollegiate Conference on Government in Sparks at 2 p.m. Saturday.

The delegates, representing seven colleges and universities, also chose Joan Hester as secretary of governmental organization.

The conference was called by Ray Britton, chairman of the North Central Region and president of the local chapter. Arrangements were completed for the regional delegates to attend the Model National Political Convention in Philadelphia, April 8 to 11.

Veteran Enrollment

Veteran registration at the College for the second semester totals 6,540, according to Mrs. Rebecca Doerner, secretary of Veterans' Affairs. Of this number, 5,297, including 32 women, are attending classes here on the main campus. Included in the enrollment are 4,871 undergraduates, 392 graduate students, 29 special students, and 5 two-year agriculture students.

There will be a meeting of all delegates in 124 Sparks at 3 o'clock this afternoon at which platform planks will be discussed.

College Plans Course In Dairy Bacteriology

A special course in Dairy Bacteriology is planned at the College from June 7 to 23 if sufficient persons enroll, said A. Leland Beam, director of short courses. The course will be followed by a three-day convention, said Beam, given by the State Department of Health. The examination is for licenses to become Dairy Laboratory Directors in Pennsylvania.
