Mermaids Cop Eastern Title For Third Consecutive Year

For the third consecutive year the Penn State women's swimming team churned through the water of White Hall's pool to win the Eastern Region Telegraphic Swimming crown. The total number of points for the victors was 54.5, six above the score of the second place team, Skidmore College.

Paced by Jacqueline Zivic and Lee Ann Wagner, the Penn State girls placed first in four events. Wagner won the 40-yard front crawl in 22.05 while Zivic was second in 23.2. Zivic tied for first place in the 100-yard front crawl with Florence Schmitt of Skidmore in 1:08.5.

The locals copped first and second place honors in the 75-yard individual medley. Zivic again first in 57.3 and Yvonne Worrell second in 57.5. In the 75-yard medley relay, the team of Worrell, Pauline Globisch, and Wagner set the pace in 48 seconds. Zivic, June Pallis, Marilyn Guillet, and Wagner also took the 100-yard free style relay in 53 seconds.

Worrell placed third in the 40-yard back crawl and Globisch placed third in the 40-yard breast stroke to add to the total number of points the team received. Points were awarded to the first five in each race.

Two new records were set for the Eastern Region. F. Schmitt of Skidmore swam the 100-yard back crawl in 1:16.8, breaking the record of 1:20.4 set last year by Skidmore also. The 100-yard breast stroke record of 1:23.2 set in 1936 by Connecticut College was broken by B. Beebe of Swarthmore in 1:21.5.

A total of 14 schools sent in their meet results. Next to Penn State and Skidmore, who placed first and second respectively, came Swarthmore third, Vassar fourth, Bryn Mawr fifth, University of Pennsylvania sixth, Trenton State Teachers seventh, Wellesley eighth, Briarcliff Jr. College ninth and New Jersey College tenth.

Results of the National Scholastics now being tabulated here will be available in several days, said Miss Marion Whallon, swimming coach.
