

## Rush Speaks At Installation

Miss Helen Rush, Dean of Women at the University of Pittsburgh, will speak to College coeds at a WSGA-sponsored meeting, held annually for the installation of new officers and for the purpose of hearing guest speakers, in 10 Sparks, 7:30 p.m., Tuesday.

Miss Rush, past president of the Pennsylvania Association of Deans of Women and past chairman of the National Association of Deans of Women, plans to talk on women student government.

Preceding Miss Rush's speech will be the installation of the new WSGA officers. Janet Lyons will be installed as president, Shirley Gauger as vice-president, Marjorie Gorham as secretary, Terry Klosterman as treasurer, Madelyn Bush as senior senator, Joan Bergdoll and Ann Fickenscher as junior senators, and Susan Bissey as town senator.

Suzanne Romig, in urging coeds to attend the meeting, stated that "WSGA would like you to show as much an interest in student government as in other activities. We would like you to come for installation of officers and to meet Miss Rush."

## Library Exhibits Anderson Prints

Selected prints from the Frank Hartley Anderson Memorial collection compose an exhibit that will continue at the College Library until the end of the month.

The display includes points, lithographs, wood blocks, wood engravings, and color blocks, many of them by America's leading printmakers, all members of the Southern Printmakers' Society.

Among the 75 items in the collection are two prints by Dr. Warren B. Mack, professor and head of the department of horticulture at the College. They are titled, "Willows on the Water," and "Eagles Mere."

The collection also includes Anderson's prints of "Baptism" and "Check" and Leo Meissner's prize-winning print, "Higgins Corners," which was among those chosen by the American Society of Etchers for the National Exhibition of Contemporary American Prints.

The Southern Printmakers' Society was established in 1936 by Anderson and continued active until 1942 when he entered the armed services. Plans to revive the society were cancelled after his death, but the practice of circulating the collection of prints has been continued by his widow, Martha Anderson.

The local chapter's first open meeting will be held in the library of the State College High School at 7:45 o'clock Monday.

At that time, John Ferguson, professor of political science, will discuss "Issues of '48," and Gerald Schaffner of Harrisburg, executive secretary of the Progressive Party, will speak on "The Program of the Progressive Party." A question and answer period will follow.

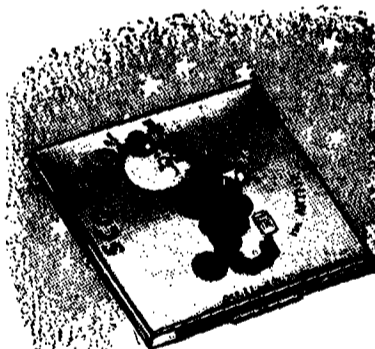

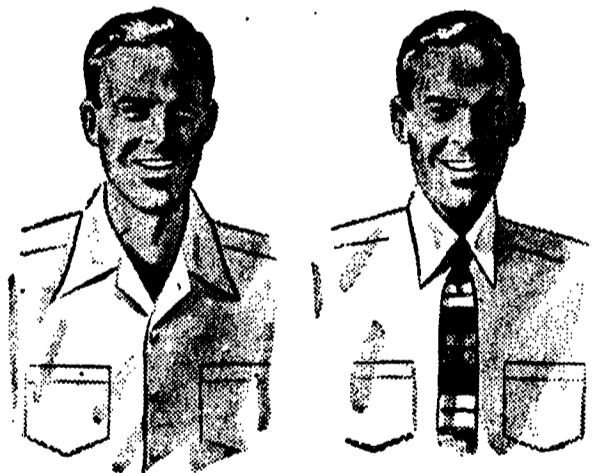
