If Mr. Cummings had checked with the registrar of almost any institution of higher learning in the country he would have learned that waiting lists of applicants are tremendous. Certainly it is true that some of these applicants are not qualified for college and would gain nothing through attendance at classes.

On the whole, however, students who come to college are admitted from the cream of the high school graduating classes. The applications are usually accompanied by recommendations from the school principal and others. A minority of small private institutions solicit students from wealthy families, but these are exceptions.

Clue No. 3 is a direct slap at the land-grant educational system in general, and at Penn State in particular since the College is a state-supported institution.
