

# Stickmen Drop Loyola, 8-4; Defend Win Streak Today

Coach Nick Thiel's Lion lacrosse squad hung up its fifth straight victory yesterday afternoon, taking Loyola's Greyhound ten into camp by an 8-4 score.

Jarrin' John Nolan, the Blue and White's leading scorer, headed the State attack by tallying 4 goals. George Locotos scored twice, while "Bugs" Baer and Art Lorenz each had one.

The Nittanians built up a 2-0 lead at the first quarter mark, and increased the margin to 6-1 at the end of the first half. The Thielman tallied their final points in the third quarter, and were held scoreless in the last period, while Loyola scored twice.

For the Greyhounds, Hugh

scored 2 goals, and Oaster and Miller had 1 apiece.

The Greyhounds thus dropped petition, for they had bested Yale and Lehigh previously. The loss dropped Loyola's record below the .500 mark, as they suffered early season losses to Johns Hopkins, defending National champion, and Maryland.

The Lion put their winning streak on the block against Navy today in a game at Annapolis. The Middies dropped their first decision to Johns Hopkins last week.

The powerful Navy ten, one of the "Big Five" of lacrosse, had won three straight games over Harvard, Yale and Dartmouth before bowing to Hopkins.

Navy is led by two all-Americans, Captain Art Markle and Lec Chambers. Markle, a very capable end on the Navy football eleven, was all-American defenseman last year, while Chambers won honors at an attack position.

Nolan's 4 goals brought his season's total to 15, and increased his margin over Baer as the team's leading point-getter. Baer now has 11. The score by quarters:

# USCG Drops College Boxing

The United States Coast Guard Academy announced its withdrawal "for the next two years or so, at least" from the intercollegiate participation in its most successful athletic activity—boxing.

The announcement was made recently by Rear Admiral Wilfred Derby, Academy superintendent, who said action was taken following consultation with both academic and athletic boards of the Academy.

He stated that it was felt that long road trips, "occasioned by the fact that no other New England college has a boxing team were too much of a physical and academic strain on the participating cadets."

The Eastern Intercollegiate boxing tourney which previously had been scheduled for the New London school next Spring will probably be shifted to the United States Military Academy at West Point.

# Trackmen Battle Buckeyes

Eight duels will be the focus of interest in the Ohio State-Penn State dual meet on the New Beaver Field track at 1 o'clock this afternoon. Olympic hopefuls Jim Gehrdes and Lloyd Duff will run in the feature event of the meet, the 120-yard high hurdles.

Both hurdlers have run their specialty event in less than :14.5 seconds, and since Gehrdes has been "hibernating" this Winter while Duff was setting Western Conference records, the Lion timber topper will have his chance this afternoon to give Duff a taste of Eastern speed.

Two milers from the Buckeye school will challenge Jerry Karver's title of top collegiate miler in the opening event of the meet. Bill Clifford and Ed Meadows, Ohio State

A contest rated as anyone's race is the 100-yard dash. To vie against Fred Johnson of Ohio State, Coach Werner will send Wil Lancaster, Rea Carroll, Red Thomas or Don Harris. All five sprinters have been running the century in 10 seconds.

Horace Ashenfelter, IC4-A

champion will match strides with Don Washington in the two mile run. "Ash" will be joined by Lion John Bates in the distance race.

The last event on the program, the one mile relay, poses a stiff test for the Blue and White runners. Mal Whitfield, Bill Clifford, Ed Porter, and Russ Owens will be out to defend the meet record of 3:20.6 that Ohio State set in 1940, while Mitch Williams, Bill Shuman, Ted Hissey or Jack Stevenson and Ike Evans will strive to chalk up the first mile relay victory for the Lions this season.

This meet, although the opener for the Nittany team, is rated by Coach Werner as the toughest and most important until the National Collegiates this Summer.

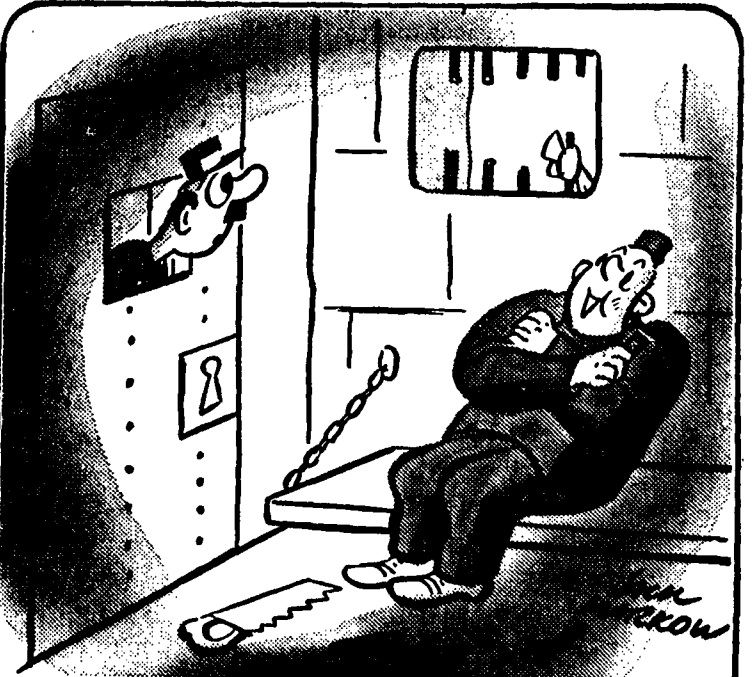
## Table Tennis
