Society Commends Metallurgist Work

Four metallurgical engineers at the College were commended by the American Society for Metals for their contributions to the 1948 Metals Handbook, the world's principal summary of metallurgical information.

The metallurgists are Professors Henry M. Davis, Maxwell Gensamer, John R. Low, Jr. and Harry B. Northrup.

The new ASM metals handbook deals with technical facts about the structure, adaptability, workability and fabrication of metals into things that the public and industry use every day.

Culmination of years of work by more than 600 scientists, the 1444-page book is the largest single volume ever published on

a single scientific subject. Weighing nearly seven pounds, it includes more than a million and a quarter words.

George W. Atherton was the seventh president of the college.
