

# Don Baldwin Hurls No Hitter

## Phi Kappa Hurler Assures Team of Spot in Playoffs

The first no-hit, no-run game of the Summer Sessions Softball tournament was turned in by pitcher Don Baldwin, of the Phi Kappa Alpha team.

Baldwin's control was near-perfect as he issued only one walk in seven innings and allowed only one Beta Sigma Rho man to reach third base. Three other Beta Sigma Rho men got on base by virtue of Phi Kappa Alpha errors. Don now has a record of one win and one loss.

In chalking up the sixth straight win of the tournament, Phi Kappa was assured of representing the fraternity league in the championship playoffs scheduled to get under way Monday August 2. The playoffs for the championship will be the best of three games.

With a five win and no loss record, the Football House team is considered the top-heavy favorite to carry the independent league banner into the championship series. Delta Sigma Phi is the nearest team that is given a chance of upsetting the dope and coming out on top.

Sigma Phi Sigma dropped out of the fraternity league and has been replaced by Zeta Beta Tau. Both teams will be ineligible to compete in the championship regardless of their standing.

## Potsklan Joins Collegians for All-Star Classic

Johnny Potsklan, former Penn State end and co-captain, has been added to the collegiate squad which meets the Chicago Cardinals in the annual All-Star football game at Soldiers' Field, Chicago, Aug. 20.

Potsklan, who recently signed a contract with the Pittsburgh Steelers of the National Football league, graduated from the College last spring.

The Brownsville end will join three other Nittany Lions in addition to coach Bob Higgins who will be an assistant coach at the annual All-Star classic.

Other Penn Staters who will play in the All-Star game are Jeff Durkota, who reported for practice with the Buffalo Bills of the All-America Conference this week; Steve Suhey, all-America guard who will play for the Steelers this fall; and former co-captain John Nolan, tackle, of Glen Falls, N. Y.

Higgins had previously been named an assistant coach for the collegians in the All-Star game.

Durkota was among the squad of 53 who opened the Buffalo Bills' training at East Aurora, N. Y., yesterday. He and Bob Leonetti, ex-Wake Forest guard, toughened up for the fall campaign with the Bills by doing construction work this summer.

Several other Penn Staters will play for the Steelers this fall. Already under contract for the 1948 season are Charles Chuck Cherundolo, center; former captain Bill "Red" Moore, tackle; Bob Davis, end; Leo Nobile, guard; back Ray Ulinsky, and Suhey.

## News of the Nittany Lions

Penn State will inaugurate pre-season football practice on the campus Wednesday, September 8. The season will open Saturday, October 2, against Bucknell University.

Ken Hosterman, Penn State's scoring ace, will not be available for the 1948 soccer season. His leg, which was broken in mid-season, is on the mend but his physicians have advised him against premature activity.

A birthday came up—the 51st—for Joe Bedenk, Penn State baseball coach and president of the American Association of College Baseball Coaches. Bedenk, who also doubles as football line coach, observed this anniversary on July 14.

In 1948, for the first time since 1941, Penn State will not close its football schedule against the University of Pittsburgh. The Lions play Washington State at Tacoma, Wash., November 27, a week after the Pitt game.

Women cheerleaders are on their way out again at Penn State. The ban was lifted during the war but will be restored in 1949 when the present juniors are graduated.

## Karver Captures Mile Run in 4:21.1 At Philadelphia

Jerry Karver, former Penn State triple mile champion, romped to an easy 4:21.1 mile victory at Philadelphia in his first appearance since the Olympic trials.

Setting his own pace all the way and staying out in front all the way, Karver won his specialty by 30 yards in the feature of the third annual Bureau of Recreation track meet at Philadelphia last week.

Karver, who missed qualifying for the United States Olympic team by inches, received no serious opposition. He competed for the Berks County AA.
