Weidman, White Meet in Finals of Women's Play

The Summer Sessions Tennis tournament is rapidly approaching the finals, and should be completed by the end of this week.

In the third round of the men's singles, Stark defeated Snider 6-1, 6-2, and will play the winner of the Shuster-Hartman match.

In another match in the men's singles, Short defeated Gearhart 6-1, 6-0, and will meet the winner of the Peters and Aston or Restain match.

Playoff for the championship in the women's singles will take place between Weidman and White. Weidman qualified for the finals by defeating Masters 6-4, 6-2, and White eliminated Gingrich by a score of 4-6, 6-3, 6-1.

Competition in the mixed doubles has narrowed down to four teams. Snider and White play Klotz and Weidman; Peters and Jesnak will meet Stark and Panacchio to further narrow down the field.

Six Lion Athletes, Coach Mark 1st Session of Olympic Games Tomorrow

Six Penn State athletes will be among the 5,000 who open the Olympic games at London tomorrow.

King George will launch the games tomorrow in elaborate ceremonies at Wembley Stadium. The competition proper will get under way Friday with 5,000 athletes from 61 nations vying in 17 sports.

In addition to six participants, the Nittany Lions will be represented in the coaching ranks by Gene Wettstone, Penn State gymnastic coach, who is tutoring the United States Olympic Gym team.

Bums Top Cards, Move Into Second

The Brooklyn Dodgers rallied for two runs in the last half of the ninth inning to nose out the St. Louis Cardinals, 3 to 2, at the Dodgers' home field.

The win boosted the Dodgers into second place in the National League standings, five games back of the league-leading Boston Braves. The Cards dropped back to third place, five and one-half games off the pace.

The Pittsburgh Pirates hold down the fourth spot, a half game behind the St. Louis Cardinals, with the New York Giants in fifth place, a half game behind the Pirates.

The torrid four-team fight for the American League flag continues at a hot pace. The Boston Red Sox hold down the top spot by a mere four percentage points over the Philadelphia Athletics. A game and a half behind the league leaders, the Cleveland Indians and the New York Yankees are separated by a slim two percentage points.

In the track department, three proteges of Lion coach Chick Werner will seek laurels.

Rated the best chance of winning for the United States is 30-year-old Barney Ewell, Lion sprinter in the early 1940's who equalled the world's record in the 10 meters at 10.2 seconds in the Olympic qualifying trials last month.

Ewell, national 100-meters champion, will run the 100, 200 and the sprint relays in the Olympics.

Curtis Stone, national champion at 5000 meters, will run in that event at the Olympics, and Herman Goffberg, another ex-Nittany Lion, will compete at 10,000 meters as the result of his third place in the qualifying round at that distance.

Two members of last year's triple champion Penn State gym team, Ray Sorenson and Bill Bonsall will represent the Lions in the Olympic gymnastics, in addition to Louis Brodo Bordo, Lion gym captain in 1942.

The first football game was with Bucknell in 1881.

Olympic Tumbler

Penn State's head cheerleader in 1948-49 will be an experienced tumbler.

The cheerleader-elect is Bill Bonsall, of Philadelphia, a member of the Olympic gymnastic team.

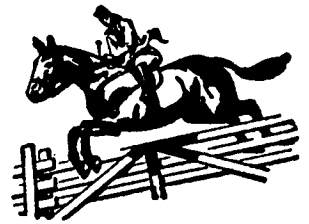
