

Lions Score Olympic Upsets

Barney Ewell Cops 2 Seconds Stone 6th in 5000 Meters Run

Penn State athletes today were the talk of London, after scoring upsets in the XIV Olympiad at Wembley Stadium.

Barney Ewell, erstwhile Chick Werner great who was supposedly too old to place with the younger sprinters, pulled two second places out of the fire and is still scheduled to compete in the sprint relays.

How Lion Olympians Have Done in London:

Here's how Penn State athletes have fared so far in Olympic competition at London, England:

Barney Ewell—Second to Harrison Dillard in 100 meters, second to Mel Patton in 200 meters.

Curtis Stone—Sixth in 5000 meters run.

Herman Goffberg—Failed to finish in the 10,000 meters run.

Penn Stater Wins Camp Broad Jump

Ho P. Harvey, Penn State student at the Ordnance ROTC Summer Camp, Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Md., recently won the running broad jump in the camp's annual track meet.

Cadets from 39 colleges and universities competed, with the University of Cincinnati taking the trophy for most points scored.

Barney, who equalled the world's record in the 100 meters dash in the Olympic tryouts, was second to Harrison Dillard of Baldwin Wallace in the finals of that event in London.

Ewell yesterday took a close second place to Mel Patton of Southern California in the 200 meters dash, making the Lancaster flash one of the top individual point-getters of the Olympics.

Meanwhile, Curtis Stone pulled an upset by placing sixth in the 5,000 meters run.

Stone, who was figured to be lapped in the distance event, held his own among the 11 top stars of Europe, taking a handy third in his heat and then placing sixth in the best race of his life in the finals of the 5000.

Three Lion gymnasts—Bill Bonsall, Ray Sorenson and Louis Bordo—are now training in London under their Penn State coach Gene Wettstone, who is also the United States Olympic gym coach.

The gymnastic competition is slated to run from Aug. 9 to Aug. 12.

College All-Stars Prep for Clash

The greatest squad of collegiate football players ever assembled opened drills Monday at Northwestern's Dyche Stadium for the 15th annual All-Star game at Soldier Field, Aug. 20.

Among the coaches on hand will be Bob Higgins, who guided Penn State to an undefeated season last year.

Nittany Lions represented in the annual All-Star classic will be Johnny Patskan, Jeff Durkota, Steve Subey and John Nolan.

Head coach Frank Leahy of Notre Dame will head the All-Star coaching staff.

Seventy college stars make up the All-Star squad which will play the Chicago Cardinals, National league champions.

Leahy, who guided the All-Stars to a 16-0 upset over the Chicago Bears last year, will have, in addition to Higgins, Andy Kerr, now at Lebanon Valley after a great career at College; Jeff Cravath, Southern California; Blair Cherry, Texas; and Wally Butts, Georgia, as his assistants.

The contest is already sold out. At least 100,000 will see the game.

Wettstone Aids Cuban Athletes Prepare for Olympic Events

Gene Wettstone, Penn State's Olympic gymnastic coach, is going to feel pretty silly if the Cuban gymnasts beat the USA in the Olympics now underway in London, England.

Right now, the Nittany Lion mentor is coaching the Cubans in the afternoons, after working with his own United States team in the mornings.

It all started a couple of years ago when Wettstone went to Cuba over the Christmas holidays to help that country get off to a good start in the gym sport.

The Cubans liked Wettstone and his methods so much that they asked him to coach their Olympic gym team.

But Wettstone had his job already lined up for him.

After leading the Penn State team to an undefeated season and titles in the Eastern and National Collegiates and the NAAU's, the Penn State coach accepted the US Olympic coaching berth.

In a letter to his wife in State College, Wettstone says that the Cubans are still pretty crude and have asked him to help them make a good showing in the London games.

So, after working out his own team, Wettstone drills the Cubans.

The Penn State mentor is pleased with the progress of his own team and has noted a steady improvement since they went into training two weeks before sailing time.

However, Wettstone has revised his predictions about the outcome of the Olympic gym competition. After seeing most of the other teams in action, the Lion coach thinks his boys will place fifth or sixth.

The competition will be terrific, Wettstone says, and nearly every nation has an outstanding team in the gymnastics field.

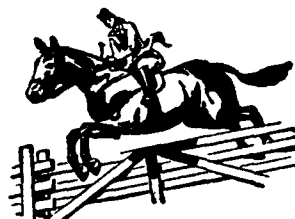
