

Oral Bids Declared Illegal; Sororities Continue Rushing

Oral bidding during sorority rushing is illegal and any sorority guilty of bidding girls before October 9 is liable to penalty, said Adelaide Finkelston, Panhel president.

Schedule for the Panhel post-office the rest of the week includes the return of coke cards by the sororities by 12 noon today. These coke cards are for Monday and Tuesday dates.

The "at home" invitations for Sunday must also be turned in to the post office by the sororities before noon today.

Rushees may receive their coke dates and "at home" invitations from 1 to 5 o'clock this afternoon. Sororities must turn in their invitations for Monday parties by 8 o'clock tomorrow morning. Rushees will return coke cards and "at home" answers from 9

o'clock tomorrow morning to 12:30 tomorrow afternoon.

Rushees will receive their invitations for Monday parties from 9 o'clock tomorrow morning to 12:30 tomorrow afternoon. Sororities receive their coke date and "at home" answers at 1 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Each sorority will hold one "at home" from 2 to 5 p.m. Sunday afternoon. A rushee may stay no longer than one hour at any one sorority, nor she revisit the same sorority that afternoon.

Swim Sessions Open to Coeds

Girls desiring to take the Senior Life Saving course are asked to meet in White Hall pool from 7 to 9 p.m., Tuesday, said Miss Harriet Cox, instructor.

Sophomore girls desiring credit for their physical education requirements may include this as their semester swimming course. Other girls who merely wish the experience and certificate are also eligible to enter the class.

The Instructor's and Water Safety course will not be offered until second semester.

A regular schedule of plunge hours has been set up beginning next week. Girls will be permitted to swim from 7:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday nights throughout the year. The pool is open this week, however, from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. every night.

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
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
