

Charlotte Stine, College Coed Named Keystone Dairy Queen

Pennsylvania's Dairy Queen is a coed at the College. Pretty, 17-year-old Charlotte Stine, from Hershey Junior College, Hershey, Pa., was selected at a statewide contest in Erie as part of a milk promotion campaign during National Dairy Month, last June.

Charlotte, who lives at the Nittany Co-op, has had an exciting life since her election as our state's Dairy Queen. Last July she presented the President of the United States with a cake roll, representing the dairy interests of Pennsylvania.

While in Washington last July, Miss Stine, sponsored by the United States Department of Agriculture, met Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson. On Dairy Day in Hershey she met Governor Duff, and in Pittsburgh, that city's Mayor.

"I almost spilled a glass of milk on the Mayor of Pittsburgh," Charlotte said. "I was handing him a glass of milk for a picture, and I was so nervous I almost dropped it. He said, 'My gosh, watch what you're doing with that milk!'"

Miss Stine has received the keys to the cities of Pittsburgh, Reading and Bloomsburg. On her travels during shows, her part consists mainly in attending banquets, radio shows, and sitting on her Queen's throne.

Sororities cannot use men to help during the rushing season and they are not permitted to obtain dates for rushees, said Adelaide Finkelston, Panhel president. Those who do engage men for rushing will be subject to penalty, she added.

Phi Sigma Sigma and Sigma Delta Tau will not have any coke date time free until 2 p.m. Monday because of the Jewish holiday.

Rushees will receive their invitations for Monday parties from 9 o'clock this morning until 12:30 this afternoon and at the same time return their answers to coke dates and "at homes." Sororities may get the coke cards and "at home" answers at 1 o'clock this afternoon.

Sorority invitations for Tuesday parties must be in the Panhel post office at 8 a.m. Monday; rushees will receive their invitations for the Tuesday night parties from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Rushees must return their answers to Monday night party in-

itations by 12:30 p.m. Monday and sororities may receive these answers at 1 p.m. Monday.

At 8 a.m. Tuesday the sororities turn in invitations for Wednesday night parties and coke date cards for Wednesday and Thursday. From 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Tuesday rushees receive their Wednesday night party invitations and coke date cards for the next two days.

Answers to Tuesday party invitations must be returned by rushees by 12:30 p.m. Tuesday. Sororities receive answers to Tuesday parties at 1 p.m. Tuesday.

Rushees return coke cards from 1 to 4 p.m. Tuesday and sororities pick up these cards at 5 p.m. the same day.

A chapter of Delta Tau Delta fraternity was established on the campus in 1872 but was promptly eliminated since the Trustees and faculty frowned on fraternities.

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
