A special committee investigating the explosion that claimed the life of Ernest J. Teichert Monday, reported today that a mixture of undetermined inflam-

Mr. Teichert, research assistant in metallurgy, was working alone in a laboratory in the Mineral Industries Building October 7, when the explosion occurred.

He was working on research having to do with the mechanism of fracture of steel, a project conducted for the Army. when the apparatus, especially designed to prevent contact of the inflammable substance and liquid air, blew up.

The committee said it was unable to determine how the mixture took place, but believes that "frothing of the liquid air is believed to have, in some manner, tions. penetrated the barrier separating the two materials."
