Business Shows Slight Recession Throughout State

Although industrial activity in Pennsylvania rose one per cent from August to September, general business in the leading areas of the State fell two per cent, the Bureau of Business Research at the Pennsylvania State College reported today.

The index of general business in leading areas of the State, which is based on bank debits, factory payrolls, and industrial power sales and uses 1935-39 as 100, stood at 283 in September as compared to 288 in August. The figure was, however, a gain of 16 per cent over that for September, 1947.

New records for September were recorded for telephones, bank debits, factory payrolls, average hourly earnings in manufacturing, industrial power sales, and postal receipts. Building contracts were the largest since the 1920's, if not at a record high. Retail sales made a new September high and were up about 10 per cent from 1947. Automobile sales were excellent, the best in a decade, and exceeded even the 1941 level.

Practically all of the 20 leading manufacturing groups and 20 leading manufacturing areas showed payroll gains over 1947, the Bureau reported. The factory wage-earner found his average weekly earnings in September to have risen more in the past 12

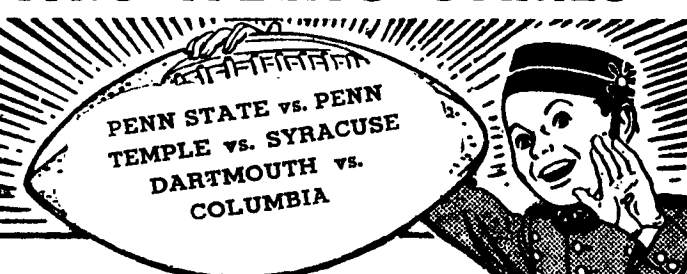

months than the cost of living. The Bureau also noted that the cost of living, after reaching a new high in August, tended to level off during September.

Nineteen of 20 leading areas showed an improvement over 1947. Percentages of gains recorded follow: Allentown, 19; Altoona, 13; Bethlehem, 17; Erie, 15; Harrisburg, 8; Johnstown, 12; Lancaster, 7; New Castle, 13; Oil City, 5; Philadelphia, 12; Chester, 12; Pittsburgh, 20; Reading, 13; Sharon, 18; Scranton, 7; Wilkes-Barre, 6; Williamsport, 9; and York, 9. Easton reported no change.
