## Former Dean Pays Tribute To Physical Education Head

Miss Charlotte Ray, former Dean of Women, has written the following tribute to Miss Marie Haidt for her completion of twenty-five years of service to the College. Miss Haidt is in charge of the Physical Education Department for women.

"Twenty-five years ago a young girl came to this campus intent upon interesting Penn State coeds in physical education. She was younger than many of her students, but they soon discovered that Marie Haidt was a real teacher with an enthusiasm that enlisted an interest from all. For many years she was the Department of Physical Education for Women with no helper except a part-time student assistant in the field. As for equipment needed in such courses, much of it was carried by hand from Stone House to the field or the Armory, the latter being available only when no one else needed it.

Miss Haidt served as chaperone of 135 freshman and sophomore women at McAllister Hall. At the same time she was faculty adviser to the WSGA Senate where she constantly stirred up think-

ing on the causes of situations and on the probable results of action to be taken.

With these duties and a dozen others, Miss Haidt persisted in agitating for a Physical Education building—a new one suited to the work already being done. Long before there was any money in sight, she had plans drawn up and on her drafting board for the new building—White Hall.

After enumerating a few definite things that Marie Haidt has given to the College, I must add that her chief contribution has been herself. I congratulate Miss Haidt upon the fine service she has given. Especially do I appreciate the foresight of Women's Recreation Association and Lakonides, physical education honorary for women, in making the opportunity for so many to participate in honoring her."
