

Fraternity House Bills Total Little More Than College Dorms

The average fraternity man at the College pays on the average only 17 cents a month more for room and board than a student living in College dormitories, figures compiled by the staff of the IFC Newsletter reveal.

These and other findings concerning average fraternity house-bills were published in yesterday's issue of the Newsletter.

Other figures show that the average fraternity housebill at the College is \$73.15. This includes room, board, and social fees. Room and board account for \$66.09 of the total, the remainder being the average house social fee.

As a comparison, average monthly room rent for West, Nittany, and Pollock Circle dorms (double rooms) is \$18.83. Added to the average College board bill of \$47.09 per month, the total

amounts to \$65.92 per month, just 17 cents less than the bill of the average fraternity house.

Figures were computed by Editor Richard Curto, Managing Editor Wilbert Roth, and Photo Editor Richard Brossman in cooperation with the Interfraternity Council and College authorities.

College figures for room and board were supplied by Wilmer E. Kenworthy, secretary to Acting President Milholland. Fraternity housebills were submitted by IFC representatives at the last IFC meeting.

Six hundred and sixty-eight junior women were admitted to Penn State this semester.

The maximum number of girls pledged by any of the 19 sororities this fall was 22.

Penn State Club

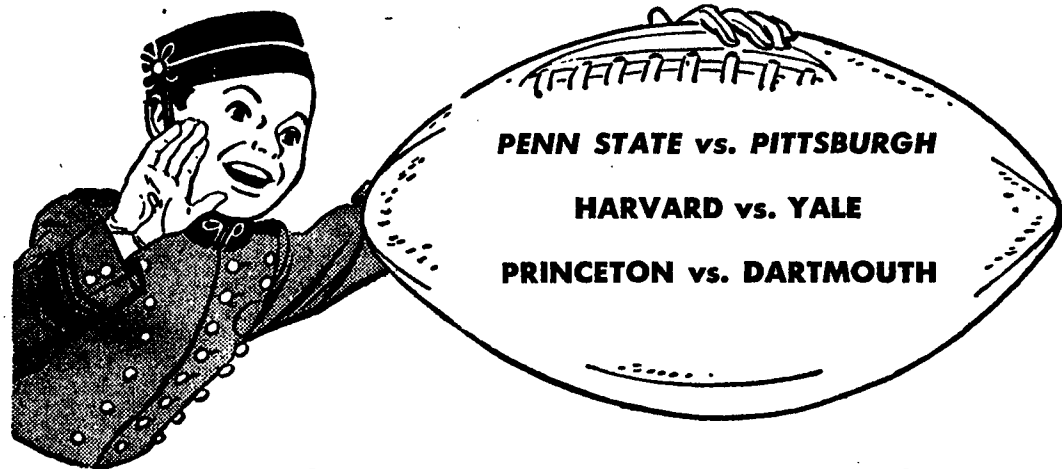
