

WSGA Approves Plan to Grant Money for Dormitory Dinners

WSGA, meeting Thursday night, approved a plan whereby dormitory councils may have available small sums of money for carrying out decorations for special monthly dinners.

Miss Edith Zinn, advisor to WSGA and a representative from the Dean of Women's office, presented the previous situation to WSGA. Explaining that an attempt has been made during the past semester to provide one special dinner each month for the girls in dormitories, Miss Zinn stated that money for decorations is not available through food budgets or dormitory council allotments.

Further business at the weekly meeting of WSGA was a final report of the money collected during the WSGA Christmas Drive. \$275.55 was attained of the \$420 goal. \$100 of this will be sent to the American Women's Hospital, \$100 to the Mifflin County Child Welfare, and the remaining \$75.55 to the Estelle H. Hetzel Fund. Additional money not turned in

will be contributed to the Hetzel Fund.

Discussion and action on the one o'clock traveling permissions had to be delayed until the legality and other aspects of including it on the blanket permission could be ascertained. Discussion and approval of a Community Chest Drive was also delayed until further information could be available.
