

Delegates Suggest Presidents Represented on Panhellenic

Panhellenic's workshop has suggested that sorority presidents be represented on Panhellenic Council.

The suggestion was made at the officer training discussion of the workshop, held Saturday afternoon. All 17 of the sororities represented at the discussion seemed to favor the suggestion.

Representation of presidents would eliminate junior delegates. The rushing chairmen would continue to serve as one of the delegates.

Solutions offered to the problems of interesting activities during rushing periods included systems of stressing the rewards to be gained, planning parties in the spring and summer, making each active responsible for specific things, stressing the unity of the sorority and cooperating with alumnae.

The officer training discussion dwelt on nomination and training systems. Notebooks were emphasized as a means of maintaining continuity from year to year.

The alumnae relation discussion group found cooperation the key-stone of close relations.

The workshop, according to Adelaide Finkelston, Panhellenic president, was a successful endeavor to bring out the problems affecting sororities and to see their solutions.
