

Gehrdes Wins Hurdle Test

Providing one of the few bright spots on the rather dismal weekend card of the Nittany Lions, Jim Gehrdes outsprinted Ed Dugger to capture the New York Athletic Club's 60-yard title in New York Saturday.

The Lion timber topper zipped through the quarter-final round and then placed second to Bill Mitchell in the semi-final in 7.4 seconds. Facing George Sylvester of West Point, Dugger, Mitchell and Gehrdes raced over the hurdles in 7.2, just one-tenth of a second above the world record for the 60-yard race.

Nittany alumni Curt Stone became the fourth American to break nine minutes in the two-mile run, but placed fourth behind the amazing Gaston Reiff of Belgium who burned up the track with an 8:53.8 timing.

Determined to regain the Eastern crown which he had won in 1946, Lion Captain Johnny Benglian used only two punches, two rights, to send his opponent Chuck Pachette to the canvas. It was lights-out for the Orangeman after only 42 seconds of the first round.

Another upset went into the record books when Nittany Light-heavy Jack Bolger pinned a neat 29-28 decision on Syracuse's highly-favored Captain Ray Fine.

Fighting his best fight of the season, diminutive Fred Smith drew Jim Huba at 125 pounds.

Jack Sheehe lost a one-point decision to Tim Curley at 145 pounds while Negro-battler Ollie Wallace was outclassed by Syracusean Al Sauerwine. Jim Maloney, after winning his first two outings, dropped his first of the year against Chuck Rigoglioso.

Other Nittany winners were Jack Dreibelbis and Larry Shallcross. Dreibelbis won this third straight bout in a high-scoring duel with Herman Bastianelli in the 128-pound division by a 15-10 tally.

Shallcross displayed marked improvement as he proved supreme in the 145-pound class by decisioning John Mahoney, 7-3.

Captain George Schautz fought gamely with Lehigh's unbeaten 121-pounder, Mike Filipos, but was edged, 6-5, when the Brown and White matman received a point for time advantage.

In other bouts, Don Arbuckle was decisioned by Eastern king Dick Kelsey in the 136-pound class, while Captain Ed Erikson beat 165-pound Bob Hetrick, and Jim Jackson, also an EIWA champion, bested Bob Markle at 175 pounds. Scores of these matches were identical, 8-4.

Coach Charlie Speidel's Lions seek their fourth victory Saturday when they tangle with the Temple Owls in an away skirmish.
