

Student Councils Education

This is the first in a series of stories on student councils of the various schools of the College. The purpose of these articles is to better acquaint the student with his student council and to gain a greater interest in them.

Today, it is impossible for the dean of a school to call together his entire school for a friendly, informal meeting as was possible many years ago when the College was small. Thus, student councils have come to the foreground to replace these informal meetings and to discuss any problems and ideas which may present themselves. Their goal if possible, is to find a solution to these problems and ideas.

The Education Student Council elects 13 students in their school to represent them on their council. Meetings are held every week or as often as the president deems necessary. Discussions are held on problems the students present to their representatives, and solu-

tions are worked out when possible.

The council president has a seat in the All-College Cabinet. In this way he further helps his fellow students to be represented in College affairs.

In addition to the 13 student

representatives, two faculty members, who are representatives for the faculty, sit in on the meetings in an advisory capacity.

To have a successful council it is necessary that the individual student cooperate by talking with his representative about any problems he may have.

Academic Problems

The academic problems of the students are not the only interest of the council. It also endeavors to help the student in his everyday school life. With this in mind, the council is now in the process of organizing a student education handbook. This handbook is to be published next semester and copies will be sent to all incoming sophomores.

It will contain all pertinent information concerning students in the School of Education. A Who's Who will be of great assistance to new students in learning the names of the various department heads, professors, instructors, etc.
