

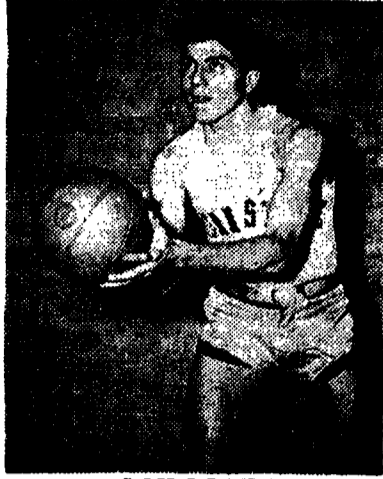

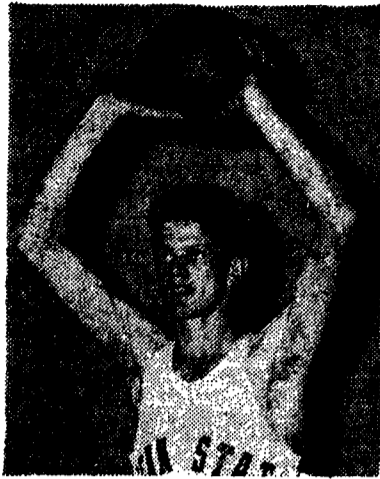

Once again this year Coach John Walsh is at the helm of a formidable array of fighters, including last season's 119-pound NCAA champ, Steve Gremban, and John Lendenski, 165-pound national champ in 1947.

Coach Leo Houck has been pleased with the improvement shown by his charges and, with two exceptions, will send the same team against the Badgers that performed against Syracuse last Saturday.

Lou Guthrie, winner of his inaugural Rec Hall bout against Western Maryland, replaces Ollie Wallace in the 135-pound bout. John Deck has been selected to replace the injured Fred Smith at 125 pounds.

There is a possibility that ex-wrestler Laird Robertson may replace Jim Maloney in the 135-pound division.

Gymnasts Host Cadets In First Home Meet

Opening their home season, the Nittany Lion gymnasts will play host to Army's title-seeking team in Rec Hall at 2 p.m. today.

Army, undefeated in five dual meets this season, will be looking for its sixth consecutive win and second against an Eastern Intercollegiate foe. Previously the Cadets had swamped Syracuse, 58-38.

The Lions, with a record of one victory and one loss so far this year, will be attempting to

maintain the possibility of retaining a tie for the Eastern Intercollegiate title.

Superior reserve strength and all-around experience will make the Cadets favorites to subdue Coach Gene Wettstone's charges this afternoon.

The bulk of the Army team are veterans of one or more gymnastic campaigns. In contrast, only three lettermen, Captain Bill Bonsall, Bill Meade and Mike Kurowski are back from last year's NCAA, NAAU and Eastern Intercollegiate title-winning Blue and White team of last season.

Counting on the advantage of a home floor and an edge in the tumbling competition, Wettstone is priming his team for an upset.

Last year the Lions swamped the Army team, 55-41, at West Point.

The final film in the Marcel Pagnol trilogy, "CESAR," is offered at the Elysée Theatre. Like its predecessors—"Fanny" and "Marius"—it is a beautiful, simple story. Written, produced and directed by Pagnol, it is told with great warmth and depth.

Each film is separate and distinct. Each is a complete narrative. Collectively, they represent a combination difficult to duplicate.

Raimu plays Cesar. This late French character actor is seen in probably his last role. Like all his work, it is a realistic, sincere portrayal. Raimu's natural talent commands most of the attention in this concluding film.

Pierre Fresnay and Orane Demazis continue as Marius and Fanny. Previous films told of his departure after leaving her with child and how she wed a wealthy widower to give her son a home. Cesar resumes after a lapse of 20 years.

Charpin, Fanny's husband, dies. She fulfills her deathbed promise to tell her son his benefactor is not his father. The boy reproaches his mother and grandfather and finally meets his father. His belief that he is a scoundrel is somewhat justified by some fabrications. The thwarted romance of youth is resumed between mother and father in a dramatic climax.

"CESAR" was anticipated with great expectation. It was more than realized with a third brilliant film. —FRANK QUINN
