Alpha Epsilon Pi held a record concert Friday night. The program included works by Beethoven and Bach. Refreshments dancing followed the concert.

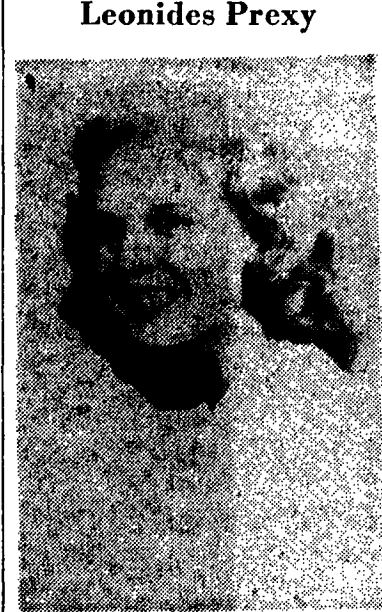

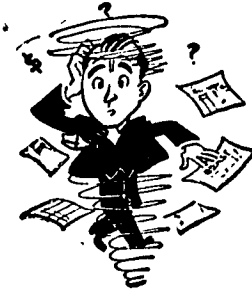
