Women's rifle team has sparked the season with 13 wins to one loss. Six matches of rifle telegraphics took place last week.

Penn State riflers scored a total of 496 points against each of their opponent's teams. Carnegie Tech forfeited their match while Beaver College and New Mexico College each came close to the maximum of 496 points reached by scoring 495 respectively.

The University of Washington was next with a score of 484 points and Cornell was right on their heels shooting a total of 483. The University of Cincinnati was low team with only 475 points.

Riflers shooting for Penn State were B. J. Sammons and Teresa Sheehan who both had perfect scores of 100 points. Jacqueline Schock and Loretta Stempinski were close behind when they hit a total of 99 each. Patricia Kotpian followed with a score of 98.
