## Student Councils

### Mineral Industries

This is the sixth in a series of stories to be published by the Daily Collegian concerning the student councils of the various schools of the College.

The purpose of the Mineral Industries Student Council is to promote a better understanding between the students and the faculty of the M.I. School, and to recommend to the dean any improvements in the school that the council feels are needed.

The council has a membership of 16 in a normal four-year college enrollment, but with only a three-year college enrollment it consists of 12 members. Council membership is divided equally among the classes. Thus, there are four students representing each of the four college years. Elections are held in the fall of each year and office tenure is two years. When the incumbent's term is ended he is eligible for reelection for one more year.

At the present time the council is laying plans for an open house to be held sometime this semester at which time the public will be invited to visit the school. Also on its list of activities is a proposed student-faculty rating sheet, in order to aid the school in realizing its staff needs.

## Choir Groups Sponsor 5-Day Music Institute

Workshop sessions on choral speech and junior choir methods and demonstrations of vocal technique and organ repertoire will be features of a five-day institute to be sponsored by the National Association of Choir Directors at Alfred University, Alfred, N.Y., June 26 to July 1.

The institute is open to volunteer and professional choir directors, and a call has been issued to all churches to send their choir directors. Other highlights will include a review of current anthem literature, a seminar on the history of church music and its development, and a forum on the problems of the choir director.

#### Mrs. Scholes

Mrs. Lois B. Scholes, president of the association, explained that the institute is planned "to further our general musical knowledge, to re-awaken spiritual approach to our problems, and to give substantial help in the preparation of next year's work."

She pointed out that the choir director has a double responsibility—being musically responsible for the technical excellence of the formal worship service of his church, and, also, being responsible for the spirit of genuine religious feeling expressed by the music.

## Dedicate Three Buildings Today

Willard Hall, a classroom and office building, the Mineral Sciences Building, and the partially completed Plant Industries Building will be dedicated at cornerstone ceremonies this afternoon.

#### Cornerstone

The program will open with the placing of the cornerstone for the Plant Industries Building, at Curtin and Shortridge Roads. This building will house the departments of agronomy and horticulture. Kenzie Bagshaw, a member of the Board of Trustees and Dean Lyman Jackson of the School of Agriculture will participate.

Moving next to Willard Hall, located on Pollock Road, President Milholland will introduce William Behrens, of the State Department of Property and Supplies. The building has been named for Prof. Joseph M. Willard, who headed the department of mathematics at the College for 30 years. Mrs. J. M. Willard, widow of the professor will take part in the ceremony.

#### J. B. Morrow

At the Mineral Sciences Building located beside the Mineral Industries Building, Dean Edward Eitelde, of the School of Mineral Industries, will present J. B. Morrow, vice-president of the Pittsburgh Consolidation Coal Co. and president of the Bituminous Research Institute.

Students, faculty, and townspeople are invited to attend the programs.
