

Felbaum Gains Award As Week's Top Player

An unsung lineman came into the sports spotlight last night when Fred Felbaum, Nittany guard, was named the outstanding football player of the week for his work in the Penn State-Nebraska game.

Felbaum, a 195-pound reserve guard from Youngstown, Pa., charged the Husker line and broke up plays throughout Saturday's game.

FIRST AWARD

This award, presented by the State College Commerce Club, is the first of a weekly series which will honor a Lion griddier after each game.

Movies taken of the game showed that Felbaum completely outplayed Nebraska's outstanding center, Tom Novak, on defense and did an excellent blocking job on offense.

Fred, who started the season as a reserve guard, gained a position on the starting team last week for his play against Boston College.

In that game, he contributed to the first Nittany score. During the first quarter, Songin faded to pass, but Felbaum closed in on him and pulled him down about 15 yards behind the line of scrimmage. Just before he fell, Songin tossed the ball into the air and Ed Hoover gathered it in and crossed the goal line for the first of four Lion scores.

DEFENSIVE STAR

In the Nebraska game, Felbaum again played an outstanding defensive game. He injured his leg slightly in that game but should be ready for action this Saturday against Michigan State.

Members of the committee that selects the outstanding Lion player are Ridge Riley, Alumni secretary; Jim O'Hara of the coaching staff; Mickey Bergstein, WMAJ sportscaster; Tom Lyon, sports editor, Centre Daily Times and Elliot Krane, sports editor, Daily Collegian.

Grid Statistics Show Nittany Air Mastery

Head Coach Joe Bedenk's recent solutions to two pressing problems—(1) stopping the opposition's passing attack, and (2) developing an air offensive of his own—have caused an amazing turn-about-face in the Lion football situation.

The Nittanies, slated to be a predominately ground offense team, suddenly find themselves with the edge in passing despite the "expert" passers they have encountered in early season games.

303 AIR YARDS

With 25 completions in 54 attempts, the Bedenkmen have rolled up a total of 303 yards through the air for a completion average of 46 percent. Four opposing "T" formation quarterbacks, Steve Romanik, Arnold Galiffa, Ed Songin, and Fran Nagle, have completed only 33 percent of their tosses, or 24 completions in 72 tries. The opposition, however, totals 360 yards through the air.

The Lions have the edge over their four rivals in rushing yardage also, having rolled up 660 yards, or 165 per game, to their opponents' 595, or an average of 146.8 yards each contest.

ROGEL

Fran Rogel repeats this week as the team's leading ground gainer. Mr. Fullback, despite his early injury in the Nebraska game, has covered 214 yards, 172 of them plunging. Bill Luther is second in total yards gained with 168, but Luther made most of his through the air. He boasts 14 completions in 24 attempts for a total of 135 yards. He also threw four touchdown passes.

John Smidansky leads the pass receivers with six aeriels caught for a total of 100 yards. Luther leads the punt returners with 96 yards in nine returns.

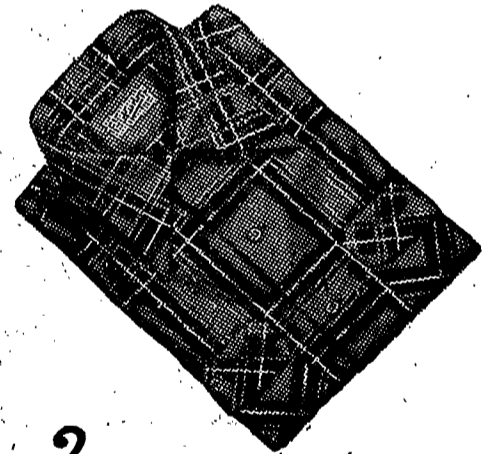
