Classy Lion, Temple Soccer Clubs Will Risk Untarnished Records in Beaver Field Clash

Two of the nation's top soccer titans meet on Beaver field tomorrow afternoon when the sensational Nittany Lions oppose the potent operatives from Temple. Game time is 2 p.m.

The fast striking Nittanians have romped to seven straight triumphs this year, while the Owls have ripped to nine straight in their 1949 campaign.

Currently the unbeaten string of the Jeffreyemen stands at thirteen over the past two seasons. The Owls have not tasted defeat since State trampled them by a 4-1 count last fall at Philadelphia.

Coach Jeffrey expects a torrid struggle between these two unbeaten soccer juggernauts. "Temple beat Maryland 1-0," the veteran Lion coach commented, "and Maryland probably was the best team we played. We also beat them by one point. Most likely tomorrow's game will be

our toughest test yet."

Tomorrow's tiff will also be last 1949 outing for the booting Jeffreyemen.

Among the starting eleven will be six soccer men who'll don the Blue and White for the last time. Two others, Harry Lawroski and Spence Boyer, top-flight reliefmen, are also seniors.

Starting along with Lieb in the attacking unit will be Ron

Coleman, Joe Lane, Harry Little and Clarence Buss. Starting with Margolf at fullback will be Bill Yerkes.

In winning seven games this year, the Nittanymen have racked up 31 goals as compared with the opposition's seven.

Meanwhile, in copping nine straight, Temple has produced 29 tallies against six foe tallies.

star right-half Jimmy Joe Robinson, injured two weeks ago and not yet in shape Milligan is re-vamping his offense, working in a lot more aerial maneuvers. Lou (Bimbo) Ceconi, Pitt tailback, is slated to do most of the pitching.

Milligan hinted that Pitt may throw even more passes against Penn State than the team did against Minnesota last week. Ceconi and his cohorts filled the air with 24 throws in losing to the Gophers.

FINAL DRILL

The Lions will run through a final short drill on Beaver practice field this afternoon prior to leaving for the steel-city about 6:30 tonight.

Trainer Chuck Medlar said yesterday he thought all the State players, with the exception of tackle Don Murray, would be in good condition for this last game of the season. Guard Fred Felbaum is running a temperature but will probably be ready for at least defensive duty, his best department.

Bedenk said he would probably use Charley Godlasky, a junior, and Dick Cripps, a sophomore, in Murray's position. Godlasky will work offense and Cripps, defense. Paul Kelly and Jim Barr are the top candidates to aid Fred Felbaum at guard.

Ken Bunn, senior from State College, is slated to start in the center position on offense, with Chuck Beatty and Ray Hedderick sharing defensive duties.

Bill Luther, tailback injured in the Temple game last week, is fully recovered and the Lion

backfield will be intact. Chuck Drazonovich will work the blocking-back spot, Owen Dougherty, who is now leading Penn State backfield men in total offense, will run and pass from the wing-back, and Fran Rogel, a scourge against Pitt last year, will be driving from the fullback.

Milligan of Pitt will replace his flash, Robinson, with either Armand DiFonso or Paul Chess, but neither is the runner that Robinson is. The Negro wing-back tested his injured knee in scrimmages this week; and although he can run, he can't pivot and change directions in the style that shakes him loose on long runs.

Pitt continues as a one-touch-down favorite over Penn State despite the identical, 5-wins and 3-loss record of the clubs.
