Coming back after trailing 4-12 at half time, Ath NE-I defeated SW-I 18-14 in a hotly contested fray. In an earlier contest SW-I had beaten NW-I 28-12. Games between Ath NW-II and SW-II and SE-II and NE-I were double forfeited.

### Gamma Phi Beta

Gamma Phi Beta remained victorious in league III by smearing Kappa Kappa Gamma 30-8 with Patty Wolfe and Jean Garretson accounting for 12 points each for the Gamma Phi's.

## Panhellenic Passes Resolution For Three Scholarships

The Panhellenic Council met Tuesday evening in the Alpha Xi Delta suite in Simmons Hall.

Nancy George was named co-chairman of the Panhel-IFC Ball. Also on this committee are Gilda Greco and Louise Inserra.

A resolution was passed concerning qualifications for the three Panhellenic scholarships, Louise Inserra, chairman of the scholarship committee, read the points that the committee will consider as a basis for selection. They include:

1. Any girls on the College campus may apply through the Dean's office for a Panhellenic scholarship.

2. Senior girls will receive preference and then any others.

3. The girl must be of good character.

4. The girls can be recommended by the dean's office or any member of the Council.

5. There is no definite average required; it will be up to the discretion of the Council.

6. Scholarships are to be announced in January for the spring semester and are to be paid before semester payment are due.

7. If at any time the three scholarships are not used, the money will be kept in the scholarship fund and will be used when the need arises toward scholarships.

8. The list of applicants will be announced at the Panhel meeting, and if any name is added by a council member at that time, the applicants will be voted on at the next meeting in order to allow the committee to look up the additional girls qualifications. These points were adopted by the Council as a resolution.

A copy of the list of all girls who pre-registered in Atherton Hall Saturday was given to each rushing chairman. This was done for the benefit of those sororities who require recommendations. Delores Jelacic, president of Panhel, stressed that those girls who pre-registered must register again at the regular registration time as stated in the Panhellenic Guidebook. Also any other girl who has not registered up to that time will be given the opportunity to do so then.

Rushing schedules will remain as printed in the Panhellenic Guidebook. Open Houses will be held Saturday, February 11, despite the fact that all-college spring semester registration is scheduled for that time.

### Kappa Alpha Theta

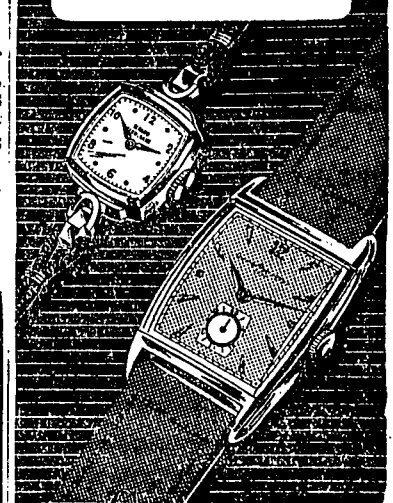
Kappa Alpha Theta entertained the Phi Delta Theta fraternity with a 'Down-South' party on Tuesday night. A skit, singing
