

WSGA Votes Down Proposal To Appoint Judicial Advisor

WSGA voted against a suggestion to appoint a specific advisor to Judicial, as was suggested by Marie Card, a checker in Women's Building, at its regular meeting Tuesday night.

In voting down the proposal, however, WSGA did agree that a permanent place for the files of Judicial should be maintained in the dean of women's office especially for the periods during vacation.

Reasons For Advisor

In presenting her proposals Miss Card gave three reasons which to her necessitated having an advisor who would sit in on all Judicial meetings. These were that an advisor would be able to give experience and decisions made by previous groups, be able to keep files over summer and vacations, and able to answer any questions which parents might wish to know.

Connie Croushore, chairman of Judicial and Patricia Carlisle and Rose Elfert, members of the body presented rebuttals to Miss Card's arguments. In the first place a continuity of membership is maintained as girls appointed usually serve for three years unless they resign. In addition a complete record of files is kept.

Moreover, one of the most serious objections to Judicial is that it is operated under the thumb of the dean of women's office

and such a move as the one proposed would only serve to increase the reasons for this suggestion. Finally, Judicial as a subsidiary organ of WSGA is advised.

Monthly Meetings

Miss Croushore also reported that monthly meetings will be held with checkers and Judicial members from now on and that black marks and penalties will be sent out the same week as the report is received.

Barbara Klopp, sophomore senator in charge of Freshman Council, reported that Janet Coursey was elected vice-chairman of the Council. The chairmanship is automatically held by the sophomore senator. June Garnet was elected secretary-treasurer.

Joan Lee, freshman senator, reported on the plans for the Big and Little Sister Tea being held today in Atherton Hall.

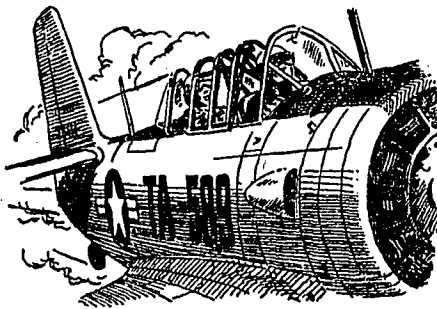
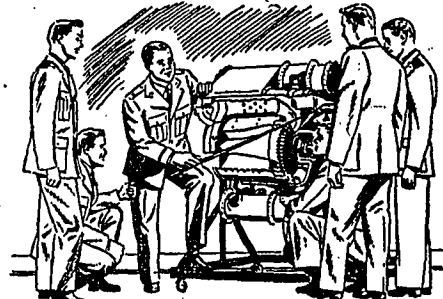

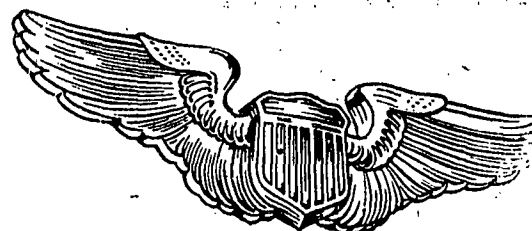
