U.S. Demands Apology From Russia

WASHINGTON—The United States yesterday formally charged that Russian fighter planes shot down an unarmed American bomber over the Baltic Sea. The U. S. note to Moscow demands a Russian apology, punishment of the Red aviators and "appropriate indemnity" for the loss of plane and personnel. The note rejected the Soviet claim that the Navy bomber had flown over Latvia and opened fire on the Russian fighters when ordered to land.

Tug Sighted

SAN FRANCISCO—The tug "Omar", missing for over a week, was sighted yesterday by a Coast Guard plane about 525 miles

southwest of here. The Omar has been adrift since it was disabled in a storm enroute from California to Honolulu. The Coast Guard said all six men of the crew appeared to be in good condition.

To Exceed Budget

WASHINGTON—The federal government is expected to go over six billion dollars beyond its budget by June 30, the end of the current fiscal year, according to the joint Senate-House committee on internal revenue. This is some one billion, 200 million over the deficit predicted by President Truman in January. Congressmen say tax collections since that time have been "disappointing."

He expressed concern, however, over the fact that many freshmen and seniors were apparently unaware that they are eligible to cast ballots for all-College officers. Junior and senior class ballots will be given only to those who will constitute those classes next year.

Richard Weisberg, State party clique chairman, echoed Stevens' satisfaction with the campaign and again urged that everyone "get out there and vote."

Matriculation Cards
Students must present matriculation cards at the proper alphabetically arranged tables in order to receive ballots. Undergraduate men will be given separate ballots for AA voting. The balloting itself will be under supervision by the elections committee, and infractions of the elections code can bring no less than nine and no more than 99-vote penalties.

The polls will open at 9 o'clock this morning and will remain open until 5 o'clock this afternoon. The same time schedule will be in effect tomorrow. Students whose last names begin with A-L should use the lounge entrance to the right facing the stair in Old Main, and those in the M-Z group should enter on the left. Adequate directions within the lounge will be provided by the elections committee.
