varsity basketball team. His frosh football team was undefeated. From there he went to Brown and in the Spring of 1942 entered the football picture as end coach under Neil "Skip" Stahley, a Penn State alumnus who also had come under the influence of Dick Harlow. In '43 Engle coached the backs and in 1944 was named head coach when Stahley entered the Navy.

Succeeds Bedenk

At Penn State, Engle will succeed Joe Bedenk, who resigned on March 4 after one season at the football helm. (Penn State won 5, lost 4 in 1949). Bedenk, line coach under Bob Higgins for 20 years, had accepted the top job the year before when Higgins resigned because of ill health. Higgins and Bedenk still remain at Penn State, the former as an ambassador of good-will, the latter as baseball coach.

Engle is the first non-alumnus to be named to this position since Hugo Bezdek reigned from 1918 to 1929. Higgins, former all-America end at Penn State, succeeded Bezdek in 1930 and continued as head coach through the 1948 season. Bedenk, also an alumnus, was in charge last year.

Engle, in other words, is the first non-alumnus coach since 1929. The 1950 season will be Penn State's 64th and the nine-game schedule calls for games against Georgetown, Army, Syracuse, Nebraska, Temple, Boston College, West Virginia, Rutgers and Pitt.

Any announcement concerning assistants will come from Engle or Dr. Carl P. Schott, dean of the school of physical education and athletics.

Remaining from the prior regime are Earl Bruce, freshman coach who has been in charge of varsity spring drills, Al Michaels, Jim O'Hora, Frank Patrick and Sever Toretta. Michaels, Bruce and O'Hora are holdovers from the Higgins regime, while Toretta and Patrick were added by Bedenk.

Next fall, for the first time since 1945, there will be freshmen on the Penn State campus. With the return of a token class, athletic officials plan to field a freshman football team, and a schedule is already in the making.

Bruce, who served as football coach at California State Teachers College on a lend lease basis, is slated to return to the campus in his role as freshman coach, and Engle will make other assign-

ments after consultation with the staff.

With the loss of war veterans, among them some of Penn State's brightest post-war stars, Penn State's outlook is none too good for 1950. Of the 19 squad members who pick up their diplomas in June, 14 won their letters in 1949.

The 1950 season will be Penn State's 64th, and a nine-game schedule calls for games against Georgetown, Army, Syracuse, Nebraska, Temple, Boston College, West Virginia, Rutgers and Pittsburgh.

problem may be in finding the right kind of quarterback.

"We throw a lot of passes," Engle said. "At Brown we averaged about one-third of our gains through the air and two-thirds on the ground."

The soft-spoken, impressive newcomer to Lion ranks stressed the simplicity of the winged-T and the way he employed it at Brown, adding:

"We often throw out a play if we feel the boys don't have enough faith in it to use it, or if our records show we're not gaining consistently with it," he said. "Why spend three hours a week on a play that the quarterback

won't call in a game because he has no faith in its results.

"There really isn't much difference between catching the ball and running with it from starting to run and taking the ball on a hand-off," Engle said, stressing the main difference between the single wing and the winged-T.

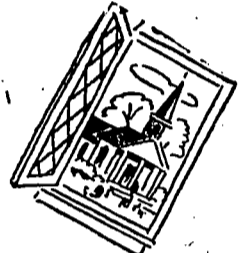

Did you ever notice how long and somehow out of tune the days become when you've missed a Sunday from church?

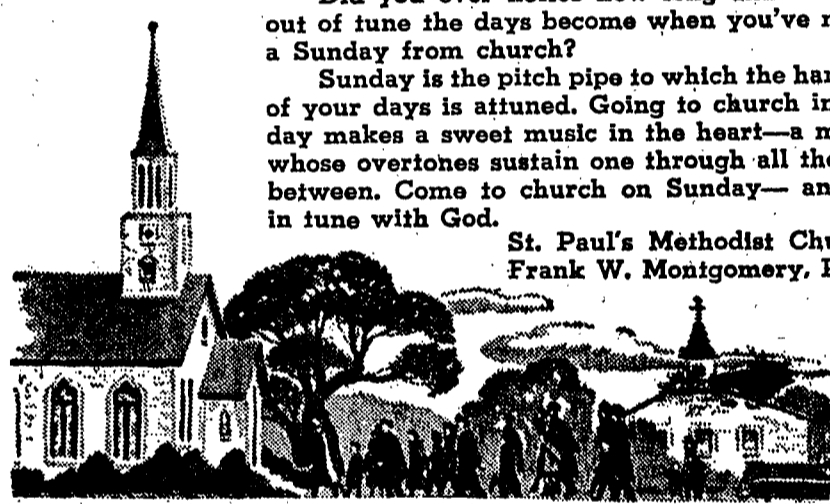
