Installation of these officers will be held at the May 9 meeting.

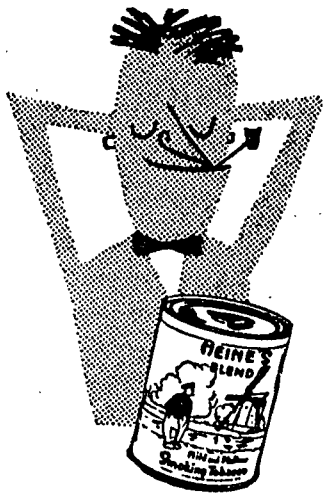
## Alumni News Receives Award

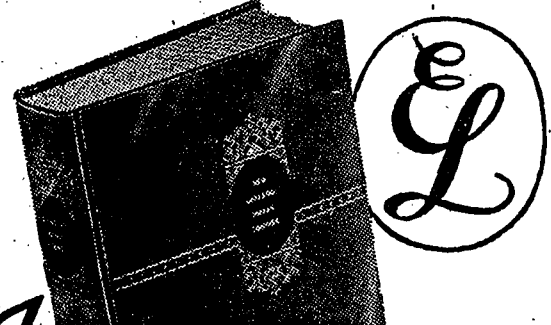
