

Nine Raps Dickinson, 13-6 As Kurty Hits 3rd

The Nittany nine unloosed a 12 hit, 13 run barrage to snow under Dickinson by a 13-6 score yesterday at Beaver Field.

Bill Everson was the winning pitcher, his second of the year against no defeats. Bill Bair relieved Everson in the fifth after he had been lifted for pinch hitter Paul Mowery. The Lions were ahead at the time 6-5.

The big blow of the day was Jack Kurty's homer in the fourth with Captain Dick Wertz on base. It was Kurty's third homer of the season and tied him with Wertz in that department.

The Lions and the Red Devils traded markers in the first as each scored two runs on two hits. The Nittanians broke the game wide open in the third with four runs on four hits, one a triple by Dalton Rumberger who was playing centerfield, two walks and a hit batsman.

Dickinson came back with three runs in the fourth but State countered with three more in the bottom half of the inning.

Neither side scored again until the seventh, when the Lions got a cheap run. Harry Little, first up, hit to the pitcher. It bounced off Goebner's leg and rolled toward third, with Goebner in hot pursuit. He grabbed the ball, slipped as he threw and it sailed over the first baseman's head, Little going to third. Bill Ondick sent him in with a fly to left.

What might have been a mental error turned out to be quite beneficial. Coach Joe Bedenk and everybody else on the State bench was under the impression that a lefty was to start the game for Dickinson. He warmed up for 15 minutes then sat down. Nobody noticed that. Bedenk shifted his lineup, benching Owen Dougherty and Bill Hopper, left-handers, in favor of Tkac and Rumberger, both righthanders. When Dickinson took the field, a righty was on the hill. It looked bad when a couple of hits dropped in the outfield, but both Tkac and Rumberger came through with triples for runs, Tkac adding a single to the totals.



the measure of Short and Leonard, 6-1, 6-1; Mark Borland and Bill Walls lost their match to Wynn and Conlin, 7-9, 3-6; and in the evening's finale, Davis and Boyer drubbed Hayes and Mauer.
