

Alpha Gamma Rho Wins Track Crown

Collision Mars 880 Relay Event, Phi Delta Theta Protests Meet

Alpha Gamma Rho unofficially won the intramural track championship last night, in finals that were marred by a disputed finish in the last event of the evening, the 880 yard relay.

The team championship was at stake in this event, and Alpha Phi Alpha was awarded the decision after Phi Delta Theta was disqualified. Their number two man in the relay collided with Alpha Phi Alpha's man. This decision cost Phi Delta Theta the team championship, since they needed these points to win. Phi Delta Theta protested the decision, and a conference of intramural officials will be held to decide the winner.

Theta Chi and Alpha Phi Alpha tied for second place with ten team points, and Phi Delta Theta was third with nine points.

Alpha Phi Alpha's winning time in the 880 was 1:36.8, and this time broke the former record even though Johnson, collided and fell to the track. Earle Mundell, speedy football player, covered the final 220 yards of the relay in amazing time to finish second, and after a discussion of the judges, the decision was awarded Alpha Phi Alpha.

Earle Mundell, Alpha Phi Alpha, won the 100 yard dash in 10.5. He was followed by Charles Wilson, Alpha Gamma Rho, William Hickey, Phi Delta Theta, William Abbot, Sigma Phi Epsilon, and John Reese, Phi Delta Theta.

Herb Taft, Delta Tau Delta, won the 440 yard dash in the good time of 52.5. He overtook Jack Hoerner, Theta Chi, in the stretch. Carl Stone, Sigma Chi, was third,

and he was followed by John Doppel, Alpha Zeta, and Robert Cramer, Sigma Chi. Sigma Phi Epsilon was second in the 880 yard relay; Alpha Tau Omega, third; and Theta Chi, fourth.

'Draz' Stars, Lions Win Track Meet

Led by Capt. Jim Gehrdes and Chuck Drazenovich, Penn State's track team won its transplanted tri-meet from Pitt and West Virginia Saturday, at Pitt Stadium.

The Lions scored 72½ points on six first places, the Panthers picked up 67½ and West Virginia followed with 32.

Drazenovich put the finishing touch to a great collegiate athletic career by setting a new Penn State record in the shot put. His heave was 48 feet 7¼ inches. The former mark of 48' 1¼" was set in 1937 by Mike Brown.

Jumpin' Jim won both of the hurdles events. He took the 120 yard high hurdles in 14.3 and the 220 yard lows in 24.6.

Bill Lockhart made his first run in the 220 yard dash a successful one by capturing the event in 22.9 seconds. But the Harrisburg ace lost his speciality when he fell victim to Dick Firsching of Pitt, in the 440 yard run.

Ted Roderer repeated his win in the javelin last week by tossing 193 feet 6 inches. The Lions took the first three places in the two mile run with Al Porto hitting the tape in front.
