Eisenhower Takes Over as Eleventh President

3500 Expected For Registration

'Comfortably At Home,' Claims New Chief

Saturday, July 1, marked the inauguration of a new era at the College, as Kansas-born Milton S. Eisenhower quietly took over his new job as president of the College.

The new president, who served as president of Kansas State College, his alma mater, for the last seven years, arrived in State College earlier in the week with his wife, the former Helen Eakin, of Manhattan, and their 11-year-old daughter, Ruth Eakin. Their son, 19-year-old Milton, Jr., remained behind to finish his year of schooling at Kansas State.

"I feel comfortably at home here and I take up my new duties with the utmost enthusiasm," the eleventh president of the College, Pennsylvania's 95-year-old Land Grant institution said as he summoned administrative assistants to his office for the first official conference of his regime.

Earlier he had been greeted in the lobby of Old Main by Ridgeley, executive secretary of the alumni Association, who had presented a replica of the legendary Shrine to the new president on behalf of the College's 40,000 alumni.

Admired Hetzel

"Penn State," Dr. Eisenhower told Riley, "made remarkable progress during the administration of President Ralph D. Hetzel, whom I knew intimately and admired greatly. It also grew in stature and prestige under the

New President Former Writer

Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, eleventh president of the College who assumed his new office July 1, has had a varied career as a journalist and government official.

Born Sept. 15, 1899, in Abilene, Kas., Dr. Eisenhower was a city editor in that city. He also served as an assistant professor of journalism at Kansas State, from which he received his B.S. degree in 1924. He served in the diplomatic field as an American vice-consul at Edinburgh, Scotland.

Until named president of Kansas State, most of his work was in the field of writing. He received an L.L.D. degree from Wichita University in 1944, and a D.Sc. degree from the Colorado State College the following year.

Directed OWI

From 1926 to 1928, he was an assistant to the United States Secretary of Agriculture. In 1928 he became director of information for the Department of Agriculture, a post he held until 1940. In 1942 he became associate director of the Office of War Information, a post he held until he became president of Kansas State.

He was author of numerous federal bulletins and leaflets, and co-author of a book, "The United States Department of Agriculture: Its Structure and Function." In addition, he was editor of the Yearbook of Agriculture from 1929 to 1929.

Plan Reception As Primary Session Event

The annual Summer Reception for the summer session students and faculty will be held in White Hall, the women's physical education building, from 8:30 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. Friday.

Between 2,500 and 3,000 students and faculty members are expected to attend the reception which will be the first social affair of the Main Summer Session.

The receiving line will be in the game room from 8:30 to 9:30 p.m. President and Mrs. Eisenhower will attend the affair if they are available and in town. Dancing will be held in the main gymnasium, music being provided by Don Peebles and his orchestra. Refreshments will be served in Room 105, and cards will be provided for those who do not wish to dance.

Main Session To Set Grad Student Record

More than 3,500 registrants are expected to file through Recreation Hall and the Central Library as the forty-first Main Summer Session gets under way at 8 a.m. this morning.

Over two-thousand students have already registered and an estimated 1,500 new students are anticipated. Although the total will be well under last summer's all-time high of

5020, preliminary data indicate that the 1950 Main Summer Session will consist of a higher percentage of advanced and graduate students than has attended any previous session.

Registration will be held in the Central Library and Recreation Building, 8 a.m. to 12 noon, and 1:30 to 4:30 this afternoon.

Students who have not completed first phase registration will report to the Central Library. Advanced registrants who have received "Notice of Acceptance" cards will report to the Advance Registration Desk, second floor balcony, Recreation Building.

Classes On Thursday

Classes for the Main Summer Session will commence tomorrow at 8 a.m. Classes regularly scheduled for Monday, July 3, will meet according to schedule Saturday, July 8. Those regularly scheduled for today will meet according to schedule Saturday, July 15. Classes regularly scheduled for Saturday, July 8 and 15, will be made up at periods mutually satisfactory to students and instructors concerned. Classes missed yesterday, July 4, will not be made up.

Each student is required to present a class admission card to the instructor before admission will be granted to the class.

Summer Jobs Now Open

A number of part-time jobs are available for students attending the Main Summer Session, Allan Reece, director of the Student Employment Agency, said today.

Students interested in summer employment should register at the agency office in the rear of Old Main as soon as they know their place of residence and schedule. At that time, those interested may file applications for the jobs available.

Registration Procedure

If You Have Pre-Registered

1. Present notice of acceptance and obtain registration envelope, second floor balcony, Recreation Building. Report to Section 5, Main Floor, Recreation Building.
2. Obtain official registration form at Section 5.
3. Fill out all registration forms, using pencil on Official Registration Form at Section 6.
4. Present forms, properly filled out, for checking at Section 7. Veterans obtain verification of eligibility at Section 7V.
5. Have fees assessed, including dormitory charge if applicable at Section 8. Report from Section 8 to Section 9, Room 6, Willard Hall.
6. Pay fees immediately following foregoing registration procedure, obtain validated class admission cards at Bursar's Office, Room 6, Willard Hall. This is Section 9.
7. Veterans report to Main Floor, Armory, to complete forms required by Veterans Administration. Section 9V.

If You Have Not Pre-Registered

1. All new registrants secure application-registration forms at the Information Desk, Central Library. This is Section 1.
2. Obtain matriculation card and student number. Former students report here only if they do not have valid matriculation cards. Section 1-M.
3. Obtain approval of representative of department in which work is taken, Section 2.
4. Obtain approval of adviser or dean. (Regular Undergraduates.)
 - 4a. Regular graduate students obtain approval from official adviser and Dean of the Graduate School, Section 3G. General graduate students obtain approval from faculty adviser and Dean of Graduate School, Section 3G.
 - 4b. Unclassified and special summer sessions students obtain approval from Director of Summer Sessions, Section 3U.
5. Present approved registration forms and obtain class admission cards at Section 4.
6. Proceed to Recreation Building, Section 5, Main Floor, to complete registration, as outlined under "If You Have Pre-Registered" beginning with item 1.
