for the improvement of the free system of enterprise that places social power in the hands of the people and makes their judgments important to the future of this nation.

In urging students to strive to develop soundness of judgment, Dr. Eisenhower said, "Above all, protect your right to be wrong by displaying always a respect for the informed views of others."

You should have a willingness, he told students, to fight for improvements in our democratic system as well as to fight all who destroy it.

"The struggle of your generation and of coming generations," he said, "is the struggle for the mastery of men's minds."

Dr. Eisenhower traced the history of education in America through the principles of Thomas Jefferson, found in the charter of the University of Virginia, the founding of the Pennsylvania State College as the Farmer's High School, and the creation of the College in 1863, following the passage of the Land Grant Act in 1862. The purpose of the College today, he said, is to provide a liberal and practical education for increased numbers of young people, at lower cost,

and in fields related to their vocational interests.

Dr. Eisenhower pointed out that it is the duty of the College to educate students in global terms. "When I was your age," he said, "we thought in community terms." But, he continued, that is all changed. What happens across the oceans, he said, affects the farmer, the businessman, the employee.

In opening, Dr. Eisenhower stressed the vast educational opportunities available to Penn Staters. He pointed out that nearly 3000 courses are available to students, and that the College is fourth in the nation as a center for government research.

"The College cannot educate you," he told the new Penn Staters. "The facilities are at your

disposal, if you would only educate yourselves."

"Good luck, good fun, and good learning to all of you," he concluded.

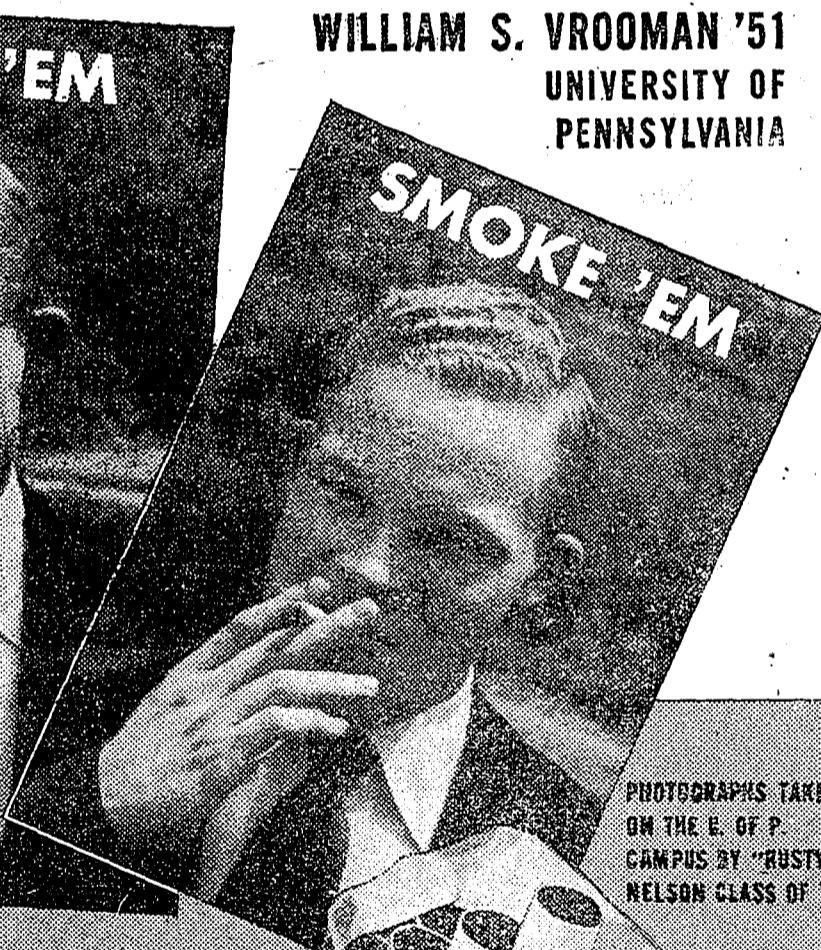
