Weekending With The Greeks

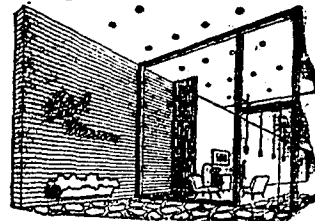
Three fraternity parties have been reported to the Collegian for this weekend. All will be open only to members of the organization and their guests.

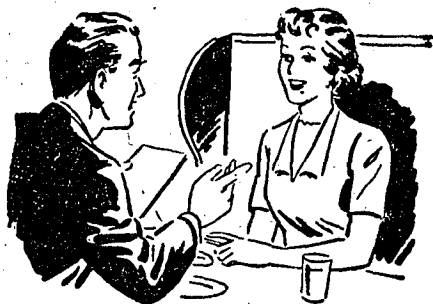
