Big Powers To Demand Chinese Red Withdrawal

LAKE SUCCESS — The United States, Britain and France will present a resolution tomorrow demanding the withdrawal of all foreign troops aiding the North Koreans.

Urgent discussion of the Chinese Communist intervention in Korea will be asked before the Chinese delegation has a chance to get to Lake Success.

Porter McKeever, spokesman for the American delegation said, "The clear duty of the council is to do everything it can, as rapidly as it can, to prevent the conflict in Korea from spreading."

Navy Blasts Red Lines

TOKYO — Navy bombers blasted enemy communications lines yesterday in one of the biggest naval strikes of the Korean war. On the ground, the North Koreans and their Chinese allies, continued to play hide and seek with United Nations forces.

U.N. forces are not in contact with enemy troops, but the G.I.'s are advancing cautiously.

WASHINGTON — Mrs. Anna Rosenberg, who served in a number of government positions under Presidents Roosevelt and Truman, was recommended to be Assistant Secretary of Defense.

A New York labor and public relations consultant, her appointment was recommended to President Truman by Defense Secretary Marshall.

Besides the College's delegation, students from seven other universities and colleges will attend. They will come from Bucknell university, Juniata college, Lock Haven State Teachers college, Lycoming college, University of Pittsburgh, Susquehanna university, and West Virginia university.

Rabbi Benjamin Kahn of the Hillel foundation has been added to the list of speakers at the colloquy. Twelve faculty members have been chosen to lead the panel and backroom discussions.
