Eight New Recommendations Proposed At Panhel Retreat

Sorority presidents and Panhellenic delegates drew up a series of recommendations at the Panhellenic retreat held Saturday in Maple cottage. The group, called together by Nancy George, Panhellenic president, discussed sorority problems and ways to overcome them.

The recommendations are to be considered by the Panhellenic Council. They came out of the discussions held on such topics as interfraternity cooperation, scholarship, public relations, activities, social relations and alumnae assistance.

The recommendations drawn up by the group are:

1. Find a central meeting place where all Panhellenic activities may be carried on.
2. Set up a system of scheduling all social events between fraternities and sororities, so that some sororities will not be overburdened with too many parties in one week.

3. Compile a booklet with complete information on sororities on campus to be sent out to all women expected on campus.

4. Present a show or some other activity with all sororities contributing to the event and all proceeds to be equally divided. The proceeds would be used for the philanthropy projects of each group.

5. Set up a system of supervised study hours for all sorority women whose marks are not satisfactory.

6. Schedule monthly meetings between sorority officers, such as presidents, pledge trainers, and treasurers.

7. Publish a newsletter similar to the Interfraternity council newsletter.

8. Send junior panhellenic member to senior panhellenic meetings.

The retreat was called a success by Miss George. Another one will be planned for March or April and both juniors and seniors will attend it.

Besides the thirty-eight sorority women, Mrs. A. K. Anderson, Mrs. J. F. O'Brien, and Miss Brewer, advisors, attended the retreat.

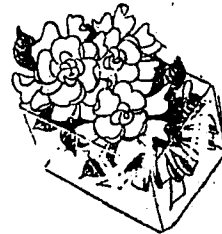
