of cars on campus had increased tremendously since then, but parking spaces had not.

The second suggestion will permit Tribunal to issue student permits, according to See. He said that formerly the dean of men and the dean of women issued the permits. A special parking area for these students will be set aside in the near future, he said.

Campus Radio Report

The report of the campus radio station committee was submitted by Emerson Jones, all-College secretary-treasurer, and Mahlon Knott who were cabinet's representatives last week to the Inter-collegiate Broadcasting systems conference at Temple university.

The College now has a radio studio in the speech department, according to Jones. He said a system must now be worked out for the transmission of broadcasts to College buildings. No definite date can be set at present for the opening of the station, he said.

He said he would like to see cabinet give financial support to the station when it is set up. He also recommended that the station be administered as a separate corporation which would include students, faculty, and administration members on the board of directors.

Knott said there were two possible distribution systems which might be used by the station. He said a single transmitter could be utilized which would place the signals on the College power lines. The second method, to be used if the first plan is not feasible, would be to send out signals via rented telephone lines to transmitters placed in each of the buildings receiving the broadcasts.

Mutchler Reports

David Mutchler, co-chairman of the awards committee, submitted a tentative report asking cabinet to set up a system for honoring outstanding staff members at the College.

Cabinet accepted the proposal to give an appropriate number of awards to outstanding professors, administrators, and athletic officials in five fields. Research, extension, administration, instruction, and sports would be the fields, according to Mutchler.

If such awards go into effect, the plan will be run on a joint student-faculty basis, according to Mutchler. He said the awards would be made on move-up day or class day.

William J. Klisanin, NSA chairman, requested and received a cabinet appropriation to send four representatives to NSA regional convention in Philadelphia this weekend.

Richard Bard, chairman of the Christmas lawn display committee, reported insufficient time this year to set up a lawn display.

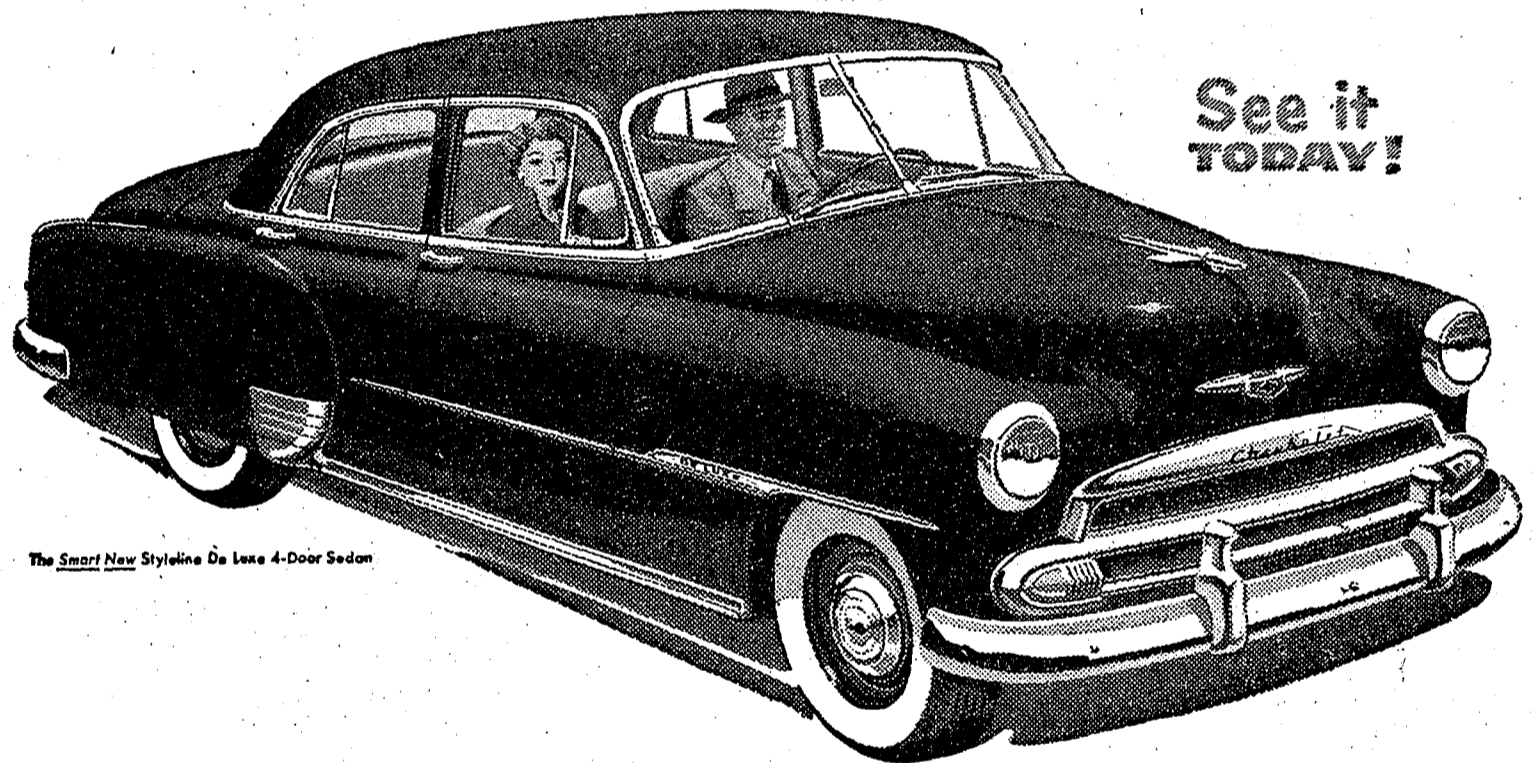
