The prize doll of the collection is "The Post Girl," according to Mrs. Zimmerman. Slightly smaller than the other dolls, "The Post Girl" depicts a woman just back from an auction, her arms loaded with odds and ends, all reproduced in exact detail. Mrs. Zimmerman received special permission from Rockwell to make the doll.

A doll of Thomas Dewey was sent to Mrs. Dewey by the Clinton county council of Republican women during the 1948 presidential campaign. Many of Mrs. Zimmerman's creations are now in private collections and she is constantly being besieged with orders for more dolls.

Other famous persons whom Mrs. Zimmerman has translated into the doll world are Frank Sinatra, President and Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Mary Pickford, Adolf Hitler, Carmen Miranda, Ernie Pyle, Anna Pavlova, Ignace Paderewski, and Harry Truman.

The dolls are the second in a series of exhibits to be featured in the lounge display case throughout the school year. The collection was first shown last Saturday and will continue until Sunday.

The next exhibit will be arranged by the School of Chemistry and Physics.

ABCh Graduates Are Widespread

Agricultural and biological chemistry graduates of the College are located in 40 states and seven foreign countries, a directory published in January reveals.

Canada, China, Cuba, Germany, Greece, Puerto Rico, and Brazil have at least one graduate in the field from Penn State.

Since 1910, the department has graduated 622 with bachelors of science, 172 with masters of science, and 69 with doctors of philosophy degrees. There was one master of education.

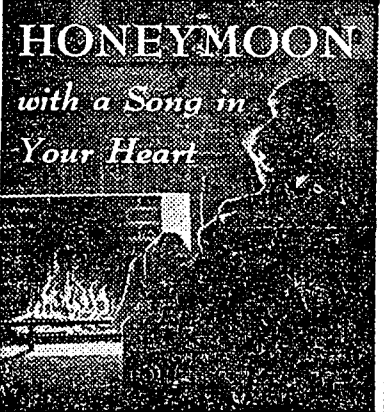
The largest number to receive bachelors of science degrees was graduated in 1942 when 37 students received their diplomas.
