world of Penn State graduates. Formation of the school would also permit even greater attention to personnel in the raising of standards.

Thirdly, much subject duplication now evident throughout the College could be reduced or eliminated since the school would be in a better position to arrange its curricula in cooperation with other schools.

A FOURTH ADVANTAGE would be in the stimulant to enrollment that such a school would provide. About one out of every ten students on the campus is enrolled in commerce and finance and the trend is upward. With Penn State's central location and with the prestige of a known and recognized school of business, it is probable that Pennsylvanians and others interested in a business education would flock to the Nittany Vale rather than to schools of other universities which are now living solely on their reputations.

With enrollment showing a tendency to decline, and considering the desirability of retaining the present staff, now would seem to be the time for action. If the additional funds initially necessary (though such a setup would be cheaper in the long run) are available, the switch could probably be made

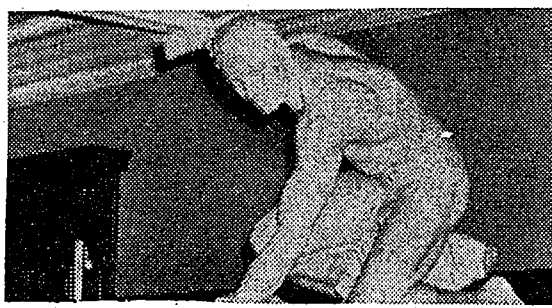

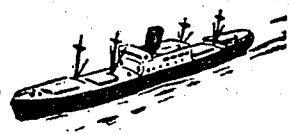

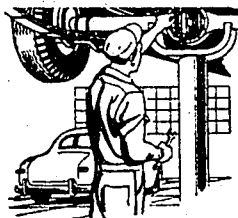
