

Lions Set Afternoon's EIWA Pace

Penn State's undefeated wrestling squad lead the 15 other member teams in points as yesterday's afternoon matches ended.

The Lions garnered four points on pins by by Don Frey, Bill Santel, Joe Lemyre and Mike Rubino in the preliminary matches.

Five teams picked up three points in the first round of the tournament. Army, Cornell, Lehigh, Navy and Syracuse all were credited with three pins each.

George Feuerbach, Lehigh's defending champion in the 130-pound class, had the quickest pin of the 27 pins that took place in the first round. Feuerbach dropped Bob Dolt of Brown with a cradle in 41 seconds.

Dave Smith of Harvard got the only win by default. Dave Penning of Yale was injured late in the second period and the match went to Smith.

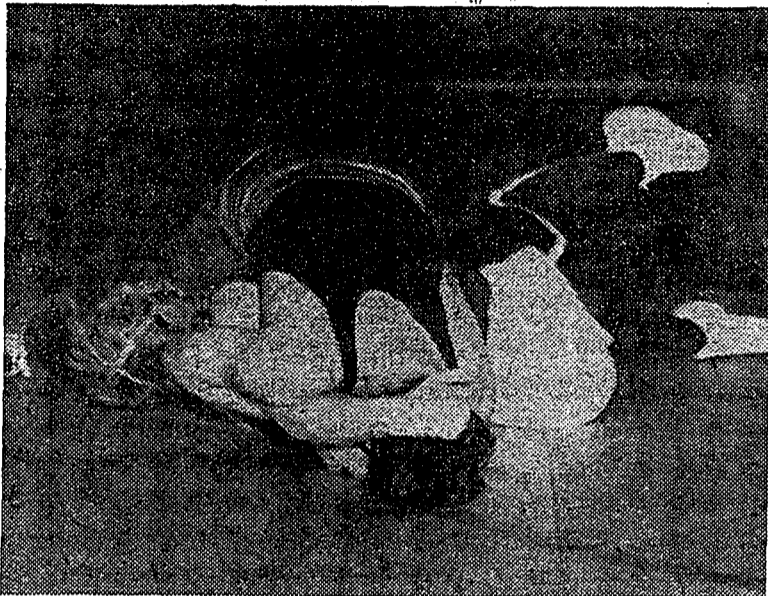

Nine Penn State Gymnasts Seek Eastern Titles Today

It's Eastern Intercollegiate Championship day in Annapolis, Md. today, too. But the Maryland version is gymnastics, and included among the competing teams is the Nittany Lion squad.

Nine men from Coach Gene Wettstone's group are seeking honors in six events.

Team Captain Rudy Valentino is defending the tumbling title he won last year. Valentino, undefeated during the regular season, is favored to repeat his 1950 victory.

Benner On Sidehorse
Dave Benner is among the leading contenders in the sidehorse event. A fourth place winner in last year's National tourney, Benner will be watched closely by other competitors.

Tom Campbell, a sophomore, will be making his first appearance in the Easterns in the horizontal-bar competition. Campbell has been a consistent point-getter for the Lions and may be among the top finishers when the final count is made.

Dave Douglass will be the Nittany representative on the parallel-bars today. Douglass, another sophomore, will be gaining valuable experience for next year's campaign.

Schultze Climbs
Dave Schultze, No. 1 Lion rope climber, will be seeking a place among the leaders.

Bill Hendrickson will be the only flying-rings competing for Penn State. Jim Hazen, No. 1 rings man during the season, will miss the Easterns because of academic reasons.

Owen Wilkenson will be the second Penn State entry in the tumbling event.

Earl Kerber will compete on the horizontal-bar along with Campbell. Second man in the sidehorse event will be Larry Jamieson.

'51 Matmen Are Best Balanced

Wrestling Coach Charlie Speidel believes his 1951 squad is the best-balanced he has ever coached.

Records of former Penn State teams show that most of the standouts were in the lighter weights. Lion grapplers have earned 57 individuals. Of these, 39 were in weight classes of 145 or under.

More Statemen have won the 145 crown than any other weight. Jim Maurey's victory in last year's tourney was No. 11 for the Blue and White.

In the 135 pound class, ten titles have found their way back to State College.

Seven times the 128 champion was a Penn State man while the 121-title has been captured but twice.

The 155-championship has been brought home more times, six, than any of the other heavier weights.



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Nittany Swimmers Compete In Outstanding ECSA Field

To close their 1951 swim season, Coach Bill Gutteron's Lion swimmers will tangle with 15 colleges in New York today in what stacks up as a real dog-fight for the ECSA championship.

Biggest duel is expected in the 50 and 100-yard dashes between Rutgers' Bob Nugent and Seton Hall's Ed Donovan.

Last week against Boston U., Nugent, who set two Glennland pool records this season, swam 100 yards in a terrific 50.4, a mark not too far removed from Al Ford's world standard of 49.7.

1950 Point Winners
In State's fifth place finish last year, co-Captains Rod Waters and Cas Borowy took third in the backstroke and fifth in the 50-yard dash respectively to pace the Statemen.

Even though Penn State is not expected to win any individual championships today, the Lions are better swimmers than their two-win, eight-loss record indicates.

More concrete proof of their abilities lies in the fact that this year's squad lowered four of the eight Penn State records.

Bright Future?
Although such stalwarts as Borowy, Waters, and Bob Long are finishing their college careers tonight, coach Gutteron can take encouragement for the future.

Consistent point winners who will return are present juniors Gene Kolber and Burt Bronk, distance men, and backstroker, George Hamilton. Sophs with bright hopes for next season are diver Bob Kenyon, sprinter Al Lucidi, and breaststroker Jim Davies.
