Draft Can Sap U.S. Strength -- Eisenhower

PITTSBURGH, April 18--(AP)--

The quickest way to sap the strength of America is to take all college students, put rifles in their hands, and send them to the front, Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, President of Pennsylvania State College, told 500 Penn State alumni here.

Dr. Eisenhower said last night that America's military strength is in educated, superbly trained men in the armed forces. The United States can't hope to match Russia man for man, he declared. Dr. Eisenhower stated he favors the plan for deferring college students, but believes a better plan can be worked out.

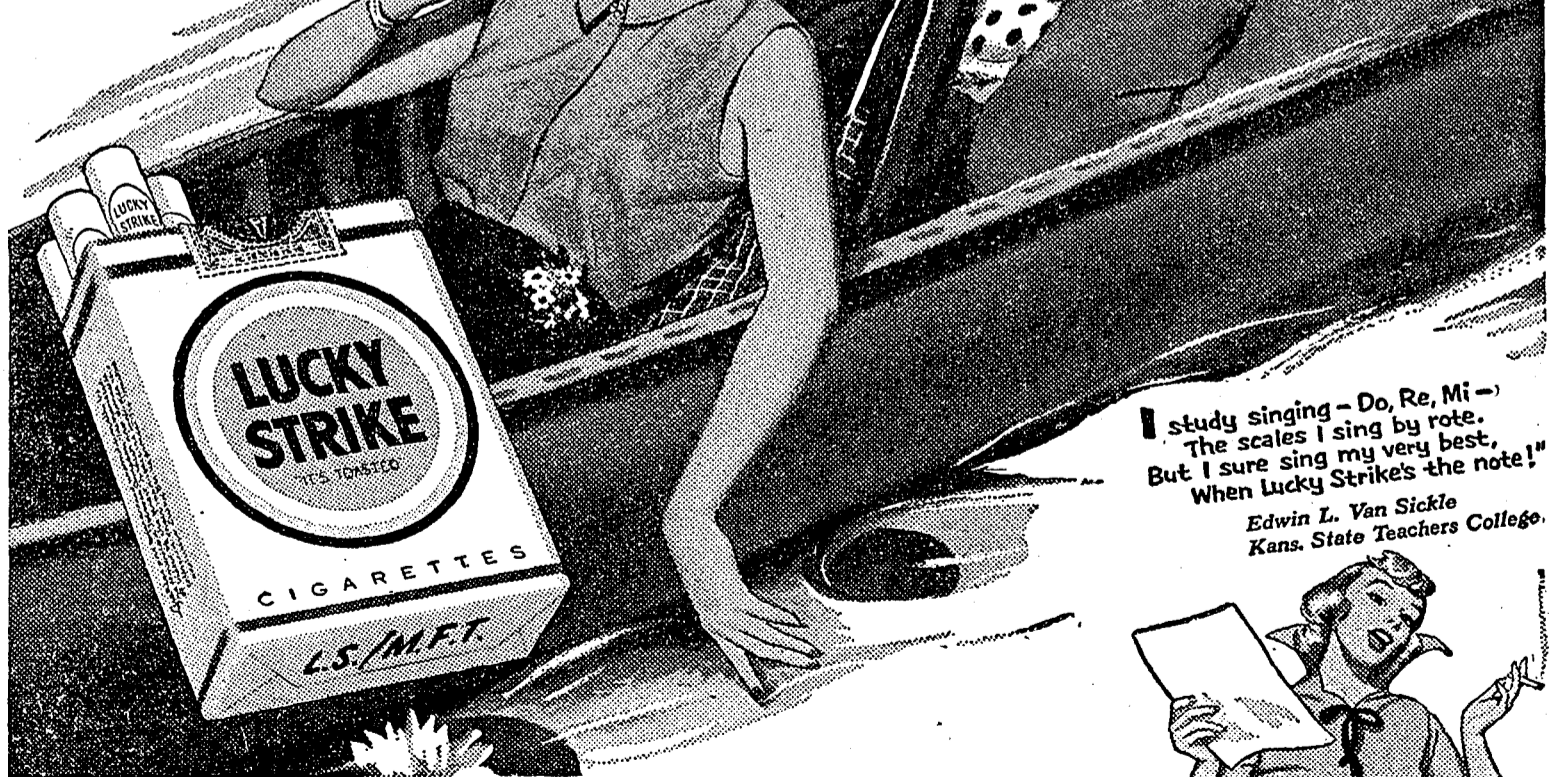
