

## Colors, Flower Selected At Soph Meeting

For the first time since 1915 a Penn State class will have a class flower and class colors.

A handful of the sophomore class voted Wednesday night to make their class colors kelly green and white and the class flower the white carnation.

The class also voted to divide the \$100 appropriated by All-College cabinet between the PSCA displaced persons fund and a gift of white carnations to the College chapel, probably on Mothers' day.

Up to \$25 will be spent on the flower donation and the remainder will go to the DP fund. William Bair, sophomore class president, said that there are 25 displaced persons coming here next year and that at least \$2,500 was needed to clothe them.

Bair also said that no class has had its own class colors or flowers since 1915 and that he hopes the tradition will come back.

Michael Hanek, junior class president elect, won the sophomore class nomination for the "Ugly Man" contest sponsored by Alpha Phi Omega, service fraternity.

A committee to investigate the cost of flowers and make arrangements with the College chapel service will be appointed some time this week, Bair said. It was also suggested that the class colors and flower be used in decorating for the Junior prom next fall.

There was a great deal of discussion on the use of the \$100 appropriation before any decision was made.

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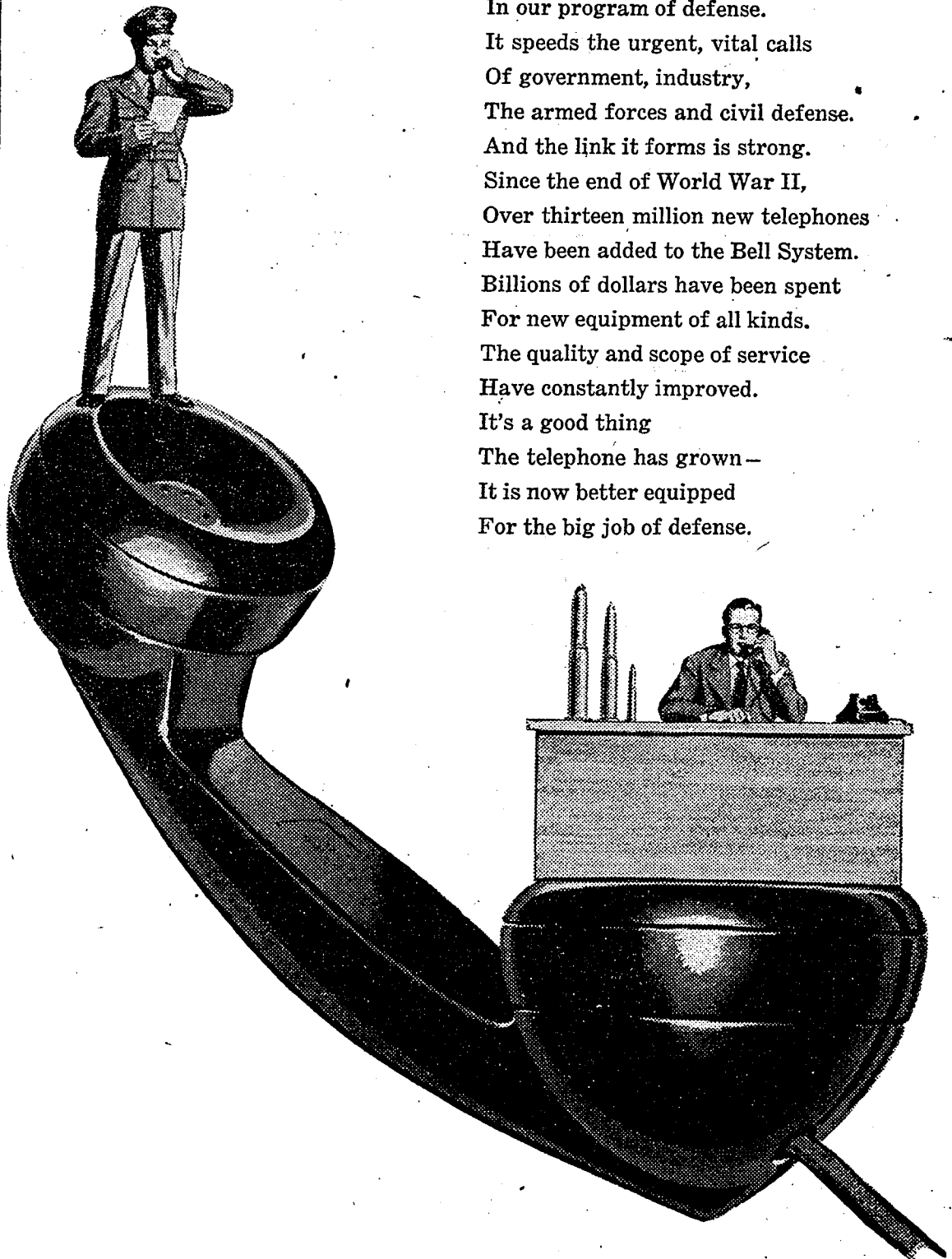
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
