2. A college ambulance which would be used by the infirmary and for emergency cases.

3. A gate at the junction of route 322 and Pollock road. Besides the two-column limestone masonry gate, a parklet with stone benches would be developed at the intersection.

4. A concert type grand piano for Schwab Auditorium, which would cost about \$5000.

5. "The Linesman," a gridiron statue in red Swedish granite which is a little larger than life size.

6. A scholarship fund for which the money would be invested to accrue interest for 20 years, when the College would give scholarships to the children of members of the class of 1951 with the highest averages and the most need. After 1991 the recipient would not need to be a child of a '51 graduate.

7. A student press. A press suitable for all campus publications would cost about \$100,000. A print shop using the offset printing process which is reported to be suitable for magazines would cost about \$25,000. The press fund now contains \$16,000.
