Dean Retires --

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science degree and later the degree of civil engineer. He also earned a doctor of engineering degree at the Case School of Applied Science and a doctor of laws degree at the University of Vermont. Before coming to the College, Dean Hammond served on the faculty at the University of Pennsylvania, Lehigh Univer-

sity, and Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute.

Outside of his work in the education field, Dean Hammond was a practicing engineer with the American Bridge Co., the Miami Conservancy District, the Board of Water Supply of New York City, and the firm of consulting engineers of Lederle and Probst. He specialized in sanitary and structural engineering.

During World War II, Dean Hammond served as a member of the National Advisory Committee of Engineering Defense Training and was in charge of the inspection of the Army specialized training program in the third service command.

During recent years Dean Hammond has turned his attention to surveying and analyzing the methods and policies of higher engineering education carried on by many colleges and universities. He was chairman of the committee which submitted the two most fundamental reports on engineering education.
